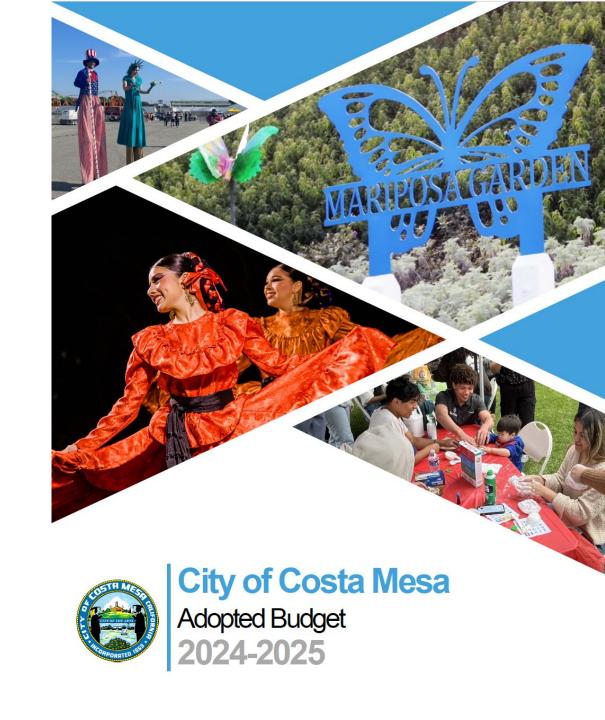

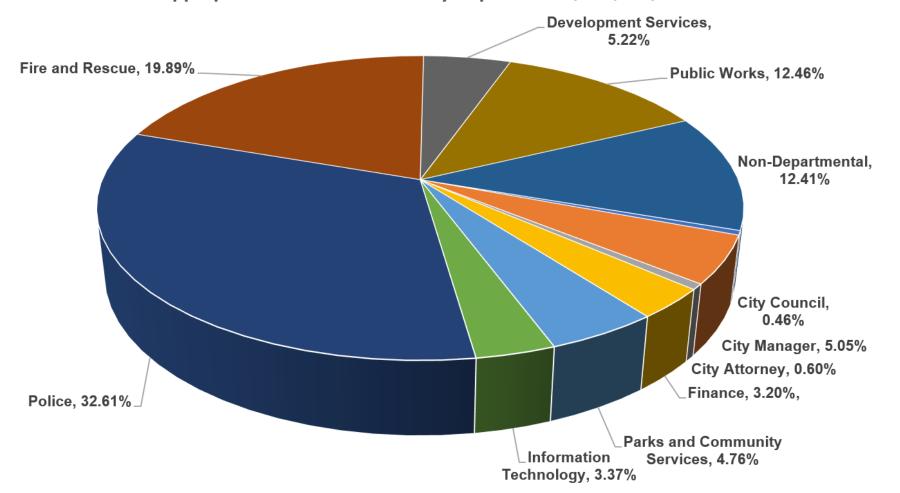

Costa Mesa

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Capital Asset Needs (CAN)

 The City's Municipal Code Section § 2-209 Capital Asset Needs Reserve requirement states that the City shall allocate a minimum of five percent (5%) of the annual General Fund revenue towards the capital asset account (Fund 401)

 Staff will request a CAN partial waiver to address the FY 2024-25 potential revenue shortfall

Waiver of the CAN requires a supermajority vote:
 5 City Councilmember votes







PUBLIC WORKS STAFFING & DIVISIONS

CIP BUDGET

- Financed from multiple funding sources
 - Can include Federal, State, County, and local funds
 - Funding sources may have different restrictions regarding eligible projects, record retention schedules, and reporting
- Often involve multiple levels of governmental oversight, coordination, approval, and auditing
- Requires coordination from all City departments, City Attorney's Office, and related grantors
- CIP Project Financial Threshold in Costa Mesa: \$30,000



CIP PROJECTS

- By definition a multi-year program
- Projects typically not completed in one year
- Identifies the next round of project priorities
- Projects undergo seven (7) distinct phases over multiple years:
 - Project identification/idea is developed
 - Design phase
 - Bidding phase
 - · Contract selection and award
 - Construction phase
 - Project completion
 - Ongoing maintenance and repair



CIP RECOGNITIONS





CIP programs encompass both current year (ongoing projects) and proposed future year projects.



City staff are dedicated to producing a high-quality CIP program and projects.



Staff has won numerous awards for CIP projects.







CITYWIDE STREET IMPROVEMENTS

- Streets improved include a combination of slurry seal and full-depth pavement rehabilitation
 - Approx. 10.1 lane miles, or 53,451 lineal feet
- Streets will be improved in the following neighborhoods:
 - Mesa Verde
 - Mesa North
 - Mesa Del Mar
 - Bristol West
 - College Park
 - Westside
 - Eastside
- Costa Mesa has maintained a "good" PCI of 84.9



- Total construction cost of approx.
 \$9.2 M from various funding sources:
 - Capital Improvement Fund
 - Measure M2 Fairshare Fund
 - Gas Tax Fund



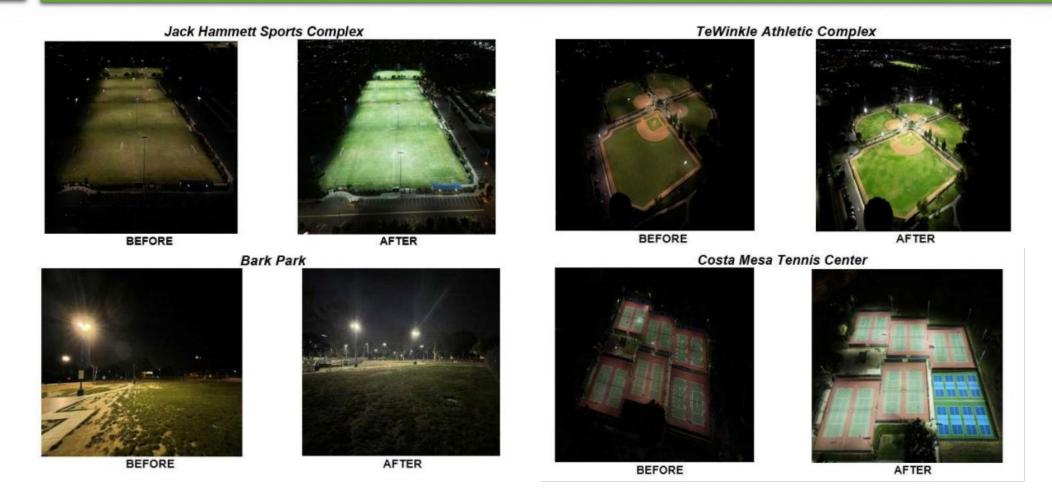
ADAMS AVENUE REHABILITATION

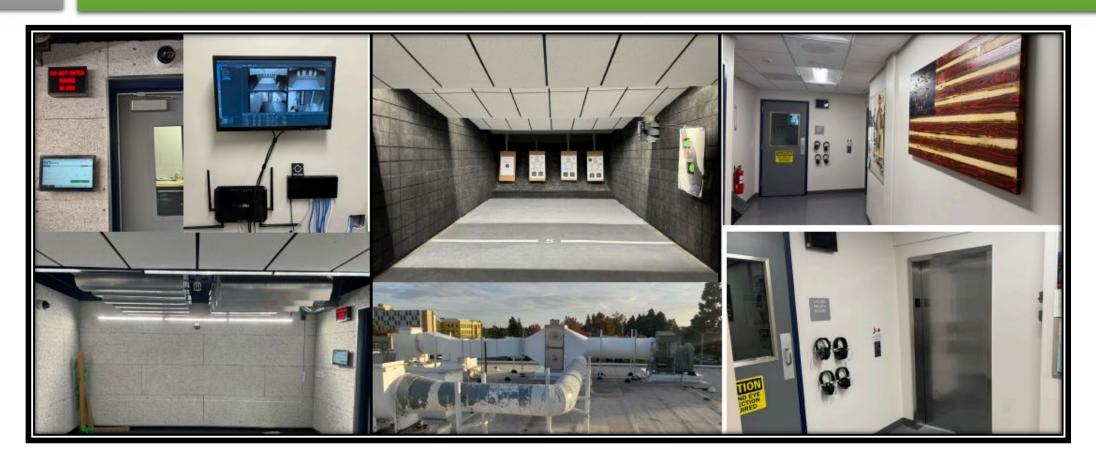

- Three vehicles in service

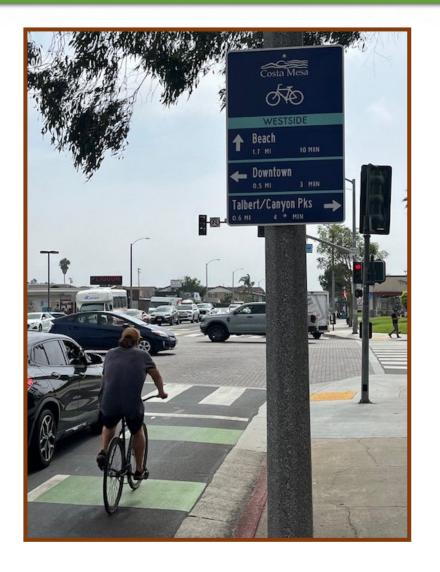

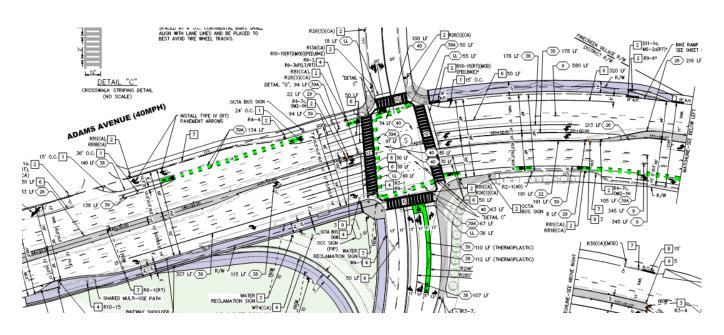

FY 2024-25 BUDGET

 Staff will request a partial waiver of the CAN Ordinance to address the FY 2024-25 potential revenue shortfall

 Fiscal Year 2024-25 General Fund budget will need to be adjusted by \$3.6M to address a potential revenue shortfall

Reductions proposed by:

• \$0.7M in operating budget utilizing Gas Tax for street sweeping services, and

• \$2.9M temporary deferrals of approved capital projects

- FiPAC made following recommendations:
 - Support waiving the CAN ordinance for FY 2024-25
 - Support proposed projects for deferral, except for the following:
 - ➤ City Hall Cast Iron Drain Repipe \$254,019
 - ➤ City Hall 5th Floor Air Handler Replacement \$140,000
 - > City Hall Heater(s) Replacement \$350,000
 - Staff to recommend alternative reductions for Council consideration
 - Deferred action on Fiscal Year 2025-26 CIP to May 2025 for consideration along with the Operating Budget

- ➤ Partial waiver of the CAN Ordinance for FY 2024-25
- ➤ Reduce General Fund transfer to Capital Improvement Fund (401) in the approximate amount of \$2.9 million
- ➤ Allocate \$0.7 million in Gas Tax (201) funds for street sweeping
- ➤ Deferred projects will receive priority in FY 2026-27

 Maintenance of Effort (MOE) for Gas Tax and Measure M2

Provides enhanced maintenance to median and parkway trees that are susceptible to the effect of recent unprecedented weather events.





HARBOR BLVD. REHABILITATION



- Street rehabilitation along Harbor Blvd. (MacArthur Blvd. to South Coast Dr.) and (Gisler Ave. to Baker St.)
- Funded with Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA) funds





CITYWIDE STREET IMPROVEMENTS

- Annual program provides major street rehabilitation to maintain a Citywide Pavement Condition Index (PCI) of 85
- Improvements in all Council districts





ADAMS AVENUE ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT



- Adams Avenue between Royal Palm Drive Road and Santa Ana River
- Enhances accessibility and safety for bicyclists and pedestrians by providing separation from vehicles
- City received competitive federal grant for construction
- Improvements consistent with the City's General Plan and the Active₄₁
 Transportation Plan

ADAMS AVENUE BICYCLE FACILITY PROJECT

- Adams Avenue between Fairview Road and Harbor Boulevard
- Improves pedestrian and bicycle mobility and access in the area
- City received competitive federal grant for construction
- Improvements consistent with the City's General Plan and the Active Transportation Plan

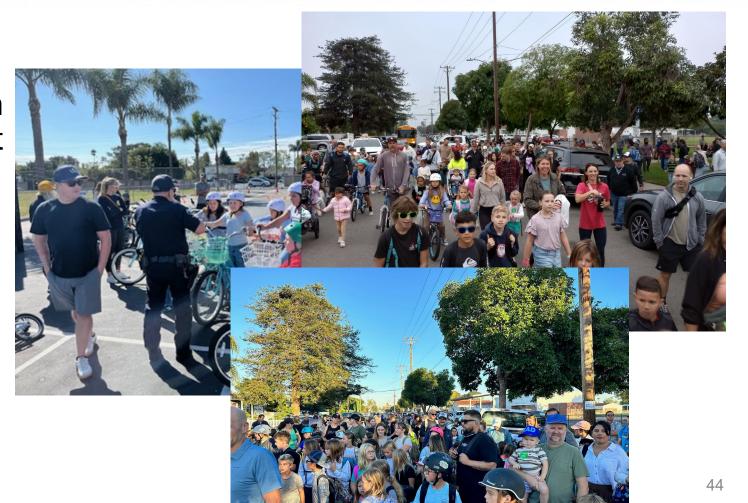
- Construct active transportation improvements along Fairview Road between Fair Drive and Adams Avenue
- Project includes improved bicycle facilities, green bicycle conflict zone striping, high visibility pedestrian crossings, transit stop improvements and traffic signal modifications
- \$300K in prior fiscal budget for design



PEDESTRIAN SAFETY FESTIVAL

\$400K Grant

- Temporary weekend closure of Harbor Boulevard between Newport Boulevard and West 19th Street to automobiles
- Event anticipated to occur on four separate event dates
- Various activities with primary focus on pedestrian safety







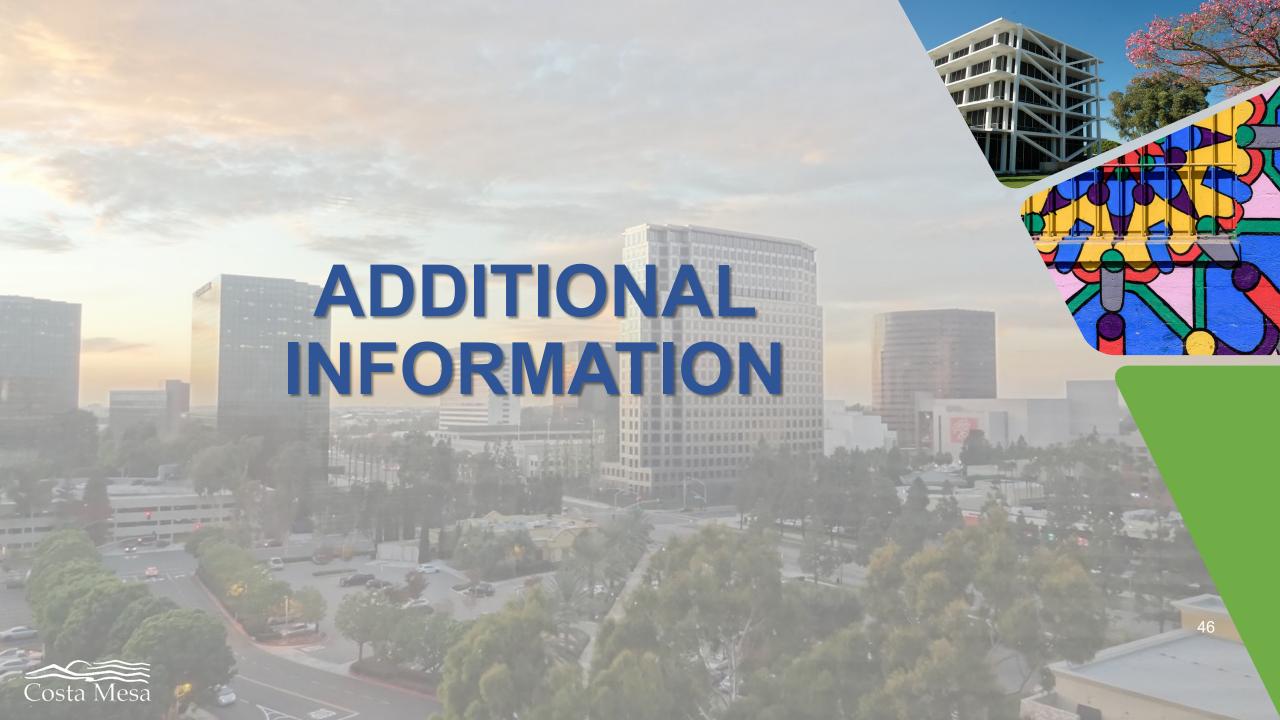
PACS RECOMMENDATION

 One-Year and Five-Year CIP pertaining to Parks presented to PACS on April 10, 2025

 PACS concurred with staff recommendation while requesting allocation of \$250,000 for Westside Park Development in FY 2025-26 and future fiscal years (funding has not been identified at this time)

The Westside Park Development project currently has prior year unspent funds of \$250,000





FIVE-YEAR CIP (FY 2025-26 to FY 2029-30)

- Five-Year plan includes projects deferred and those proposed in upcoming fiscal years
- Attachment 4 includes proposed Five-Year CIP
- Five-Year plan is updated annually based on Goals and Priorities by City Council, input from commissions, committees and community, and best practices
- Projects listed from Years 2 5 and Future are for planning purposes and to plan for future grant opportunities
- Facilities Assessment and Park Assessment Studies will identify future project priorities and funding needs



NEXT STEPS

- The FY 2025-26 Proposed Operating and Capital Improvement Program budget must be adopted by June 30, 2025
- The proposed CIP recommendation provides \$28.7 million from multiple funding sources to improve City infrastructure in all key areas
- In addition to the new Proposed CIP, there are 102 ongoing CIP projects, totaling approximately \$93 million
- The one-year waiver of the General Fund transfer for the CAN Ordinance provides a method for reducing General Fund expenses while not impacting core City services
