



Hi Ms. Nanthavongdouangsy and Mr. Arios:

In connection with Consent Calendar Item 3 on tonight's Planning Commission agenda, I have questions/requests to which I would appreciate receiving responses, along with some comments. They are as follows:

### Staff Report:

Pages 8-9, *The City's progress in meeting its share of the RHNA allocation*: Missing from the description is the fact that the City is still in a state of noncompliance with the California Department of Housing and Community Development ("HCD"), and therefore is subject to not only the "Builders Remedy," but it will possibly not receive funding for transportation and other projects because of its state of noncompliance. This was due to the City's failure to timely file a compliant document last year, which resulted in the loss of the two-year extension to complete the programs in the Housing Element. The programs in the Housing Element are time-consuming and likely to take more than one year, which puts the City in the position of perpetual noncompliance.

Page 10, <u>A listing of sites rezoned to accommodate the City's share of regional housing need:</u> Please provide a schedule of the community visioning meetings that are to be initiated in the Summer of 2023.

Also Page 10, The number of net new housing units provided this far in the housing element cycle: Fairview Developmental Center Re-Use - Please provide a schedule of deadlines and meetings scheduled for this project.

Draft Annual Report of the Costa Mesa 2016-2035 General Plan:

Page 30 - Safety Enforcement and Reporting - Objective C-8B - The Suggested Routes to Schools are from 2010. They have not been updated and reporting their delivery 13 years ago seems to be a stretch when saying the City is meeting this Objective. Please provide further information regarding how the City is meeting the Objective.

Pages 32 and 33 - The Sections for Circulation Element Goals C10, C-11 and C-12 give the description of the City's Action as "Ongoing." This is inadequate in that it is vague and unintelligible to the general public. Please provide a comprehensive description of what the City is doing to meet these goals.

Appendix B.1 - Housing Successor Annual Report FY 20-21. This Annual Report was presented to the City Council at its January 22, 2022, meeting. At that meeting, following Staff's recommendation, the Annual Report was received and filed. In the report it states that it would be posted on the City's website, which it was <u>not</u>, and it would be appended to the City's annual update report.

The HCD requires that these reports be filed annually, but neither report was timely filed, which means the City, once again, missed a filing deadline. Why was the 20-21 report not filed? Comparing the report that was presented to the City Council and tonight's version, there is no difference. Yet, 18 months have passed. Is there a reason why the City does not timely file required documents with the HCD?
