SUBJECT: Comments on the Fairview Park Master Plan Update

Dear Honorable Mayor, Councilmembers, Fairview Park staff, and Master Plan consultants:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the 2025 Fairview Park Master Plan Update. Coastal Corridor Alliance (CCA) is making some general recommendations on Plan efficacy, particularly related to preserving the native habitats that exist at the Park.

We have listed each comment by **Page #** and **Context**, followed by our comment, question, or response, and a **Recommendation** if we have one. Direct quotes from the Master Plan are quoted and in italics.

We hope our substantive comments help create a great final draft of this pivotal planning document for Costa Mesa's beloved nature park.

General Comments

General Comment 1: Rename the Site to Fairview Nature Preserve

The word 'Park' does not represent the designation of the site as a place for restoring natural habitats and low-impact human activities. To reduce confusion and give people a better idea of

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what the nature of the place is, please rename Fairview Park to **Fairview Nature Preserve** or **Fairview Nature Park**

General Comment 2: Add a Conservation Easement Protection for the West Side Habitats.

While portions of the site are protected under a conservation easement, many of the most sensitive habitats are not protected in this way. The vernal pools are federally protected sensitive habitat, but are not under the protection of a conservation easement. Please add this permanent protection across the west side of the Park, which will make possible uses more clear, qualify the land for California's 30x30 initiative, and increase funding availability for future restoration work.

General Comment 3: Increase Funding for Better Enforcement and Staffing.

To manage the goals of this and previous Master Plans well, it **will require additional funding**. We ask the City to allocate what is needed for a well-managed, well-staffed nature park.

General Comment 4: Include the consultants' recommendation matrix and the Fairview Park Steering Committee (FPSC) and Parks and Community Services (PACS) Commission recommendations as attachments to the Master Plan.

General Comment 5: CCA's position on the 25 Consultant Recommendations (See Attachment 1).

The City consultants compiled a matrix of 25 recommendations for the site, which the FPSC and PACS Commission have responded to. CCA has added our recommendations to this matrix, found in Attachment 1 of this letter.

In summary, our recommendations include:

- Full support for consultant recommendations: 1-3, 5, 7-9, 11-13, 18, 21-24.
- Full support for FPSC's amended recommendations: 4, 6, 10, 15-17, 19-20.
- Support with amendments:
 - **14:** Continue the current Master Plan recommendation that calls for stabilization and habitat restoration of the Fairview Park west bluffs to protect natural resources and public safety, **using natural materials only**.
 - **25:** Modify and refine the name of the Fairview Park site to a more nature-oriented name, such as **"Fairview Nature Preserve"** or "Fairview Nature Park" to reflect the

site's exceptional natural resources, significant conservation value, and lasting legacy as Costa Mesa's premier natural open space asset.

Chapter 01 - Introduction

Executive Summary, Pg. 7

CCA supports the descriptions of target park uses of:

"...restoring and preserving the park as an environmental resource for study, interpretation, and education as well as passive recreation and a range of compatible public uses. These include walking and jogging trails, picnicking, wildlife viewing and nature exploration, unique hobbyist activities and other low-impact activities that connect community residents to the natural environment."

Executive Summary, Pg. 7 / Whole document

We'd like to see 'passive' and 'active' be abandoned due to their being open to wide interpretations. Change the wording from 'passive recreation' to 'low impact activities.' Then, define 'low impact activities' here and throughout the document to be more specific. It would be defined as 'human activities that have low impact to ecological and/or cultural features.' This phrase is more descriptive to include the impacts that should be avoided. Activities at Fairview Park should be least disruptive to ecosystem function and historical cultural resources and present day cultural engagements.

Recommendation: Complete a global change in the use of the phrase "passive recreation" and make it "low impact activities."

Executive Summary, Pg.7

CCA supports the goal of the Master Plan Update as a long term general management plan which "...safeguards cultural resources and conserves biological resources, including the essential vernal pool habitat..." "...ensuring future generations have the same opportunity to enjoy this beloved and unique place."

Executive Summary: Critical Themes and Initiatives, Pg. 8

This is a key point: "[With] 6.5 miles of trails the park has one of the highest trail densities in the region"

Recommendation: Consider highlighting this in a graphic or table comparison of other regional nature parks.

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Executive Summary: Regulatory Protections and Resource Management, Pg. 10

We appreciate the care that went into listing the framework of regulatory protections, but believe two more items should be included.

Recommendation: Consider making this a bullet list of laws or a full page graphic; incorporate "including, but not limited to" in the list; add the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA); add Costa Mesa's Conservation Element.

Executive Summary, Pg. 10

Recommendation: "Prevent further damage to cultural **and ecological** resources through site management."

Executive Summary, Key Findings from Community Engagement, Pg. 10 & 11 Recommendation: Please include the mentioned Appendix A.

Executive Summary, Key Findings from Community Engagement / Conflicting Opinions on Recreational Activities, Pg. 11

"These conflicting viewpoints indicate the need for careful balancing of recreational activities with conservation priorities in the Master Plan Update and application of regulatory requirements."

Recommendation: Change to: "Careful evaluation of the ecological impacts, conservation priorities, and regulatory requirements of these activities have been carried out by contracted professionals for this Master Plan."

Recommendation: Remove duplicate page 10 content, keep page 11 content.

"Restore and Enhance Habitat. Implement 80 acres of habitat restoration and 14.5 acres of habitat enhancement to support native plants and wildlife, remove artificial fill where feasible, and improve ecological health and biodiversity over the long term."

Recommendation: Add to the beginning of this paragraph: "Implement habitat restoration and enhancement on all undeveloped areas currently occupied by degraded soil or invasive species, including 80 acres..."

Key Findings from Community Engagement / Recommendations, Pg. 11

The CA Department of Fish and Wildlife letter dated September 25, 2025 was clear that the fly field impacts are not "potential," they are direct, indirect, and cumulative. This language implies

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status quo when the agencies have been clear about the impacts and risks to the City to maintain the flyfield as is.

"Manage Recreational Impacts: Coordinate with organized user groups (i.e. model gliders and trains) to allow the continuation of designated uses while mitigating potential environmental impacts. In accordance with Resource Agency recommendations, relocate the model glider flying field with the goal of reducing ongoing impacts to sensitive biological resources."

Recommendations: Remove 'potential' environmental impacts. Additionally, we recommend the City/Parks staff come up with official rubric and designations of which activities have high, medium, and low impacts for their intended areas.

Goals & Objectives, Pg. 12

We support the four goals listed.

Recommendations: Please change 'passive' to 'low ecological impact' here and throughout the document.

Outreach Summary, Pg. 17 - 19

CCA agrees with or supports:

- Removing the dirt mound (and all improper fill)
- Incorporating fencing to enhance trail definition and habitat protection
- Including signage, such as: ecological education signs, multilingual signs
 - **Recommendation:** include a provision in the Master Plan to potentially integrate signage design with a larger trail network including adjacent open space lands.
- Incorporating ADA accessibility
- Ensuring nature play area only in lawn area
- Limiting the Museum / Field House to non-environmentally sensitive locations
- Keeping all bikes on paved paths only
- Making the use of e-bikes illegal in the park or if allowed, set and enforce a speed limit
- Adhering to the agency's findings and recommendations regarding glider activity
- Implementing boardwalk restoration and elevated trails
- Increasing park ranger and staffing resources
- Allowing for a staff-run grow space / native plant nursery on site

• Integrating City teen and kid programs with Fairview Park Staff activities, volunteer, and educational activities, etc.

CCA opposes:

 Adding BMX riding of the dirt mounds as it directly conflicts with the removal of the fill material

Chapter 02 - Existing Planning Conditions

Pg. 21

CCA is opposed to the lowlands shared parking lot concept as it introduces considerable impacts that are in conflict with the City's stated goals.

Pg. 28

CCA supports the descriptions and intentions of the General Plan elements outlined here, including future Open Space and Recreation Element updates classifying Fairview Park as an ecological preserve.

Recommendation: Place a conservation easement over the West side of the Park, excluding the lawn area.

Chapter 03 - Existing Site Conditions

Cultural and Tribal Cultural Resources, Pg. 40

Support for protecting Tribal cultural resources by closing social trails with fences or other semi-permanent barriers, including but not limited to revegetation by native plant species.

Grasslands, Pg. 45

All steps must be taken to prevent local / regional extinction of the species that only remain in Fairview Park: "Fairview Park supports the only Orange County population of several of these rare species."

Chapter 04 - Opportunities & Constraints

Constraints / Vernal Pools, Pg. 57

Recommendation: Adhere to and incorporate the rules and designations of the resource agencies as planning guidance and constraints.

Habitat Restoration, Pg. 60

We concur with this statement: "The most significant threats to sensitive biological resources in Fairview Park come from human actions that destroy, degrade, and fragment the park's natural communities." Our recommendations align with maintaining lower impact activities at Fairview.

Chapter 05 - Design Objectives

Objectives / Public Use, Pg. 64

We agree with all objectives, but note:

- **Objective 2** should acknowledge more funding is needed.
- Objectives 3 and 4: While we understand many decisions have been made regarding uses at Fairview Park, should those uses be found to cause harm, violate the law, or increase liability/risk for the City—they should be re-evaluated at regular intervals, as new information is available each year. As stated publicly before, CCA supports the resource agencies' positions on reducing impacts to sensitive habitats, mainly vernal pools and their associated watersheds.
- **Objective 3, List Item 3, and Objective 4 List Item 1:** As a partner with the City using the park, ensure HSS absorbs any future costs the City would otherwise incur for continued use. The group itself should be responsible for the costs associated with the activity since it has very low participation, brings additional environmental liabilities, and doesn't align with the intended uses of the site.

Objectives / Cultural and Tribal Cultural Restoration, Pg. 65

CCA supports all six objectives.

Chapter 06 - The Master Plan

West of Placentia Avenue, Pg. 69-72

Existing Park Improvements

We discourage planting additional trees so as not to create bird nesting and perch space outside of habitat for birds foraging / hunting in habitat. Doing this would create an imbalance of a few bird species.

We encourage the City to develop and adopt a native plant palette for use at Fairview Park. Then, when planting or replacing trees anywhere in the Park, including the developed lawn area, this plant palette is approved already.

Central Interpretive Area

Support for the location, purpose, and description of the interpretive area. Please use only natural materials.

Glider Launch Site

We agree with the natural resource agencies that the existing location of glider launching has detrimental impacts on the environment. We support adhering to the guidance and recommendations of California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) and US Fish and Wildlife Service. From the CDFW letter dated September 25, 2025, "CDFW strongly supports relocation of the model airplane flyfield, as its continued operation in the vernal pool complex is in **direct conflict** with preservation and management of this important park feature." (emphasis added) We also concur with the recommendations of the Fairview Park Steering Committee and Parks and Community Services Commission in this regard.

Vernal pools, Archaeological site, Trail delineation, Access to Talbert Nature Preserve We agree with the plans outlined.

Bluff Erosion and Access

Please do not use plastic geoweb or other materials that degrade harmful chemicals into the environment for erosion control or any other purpose at the park.

Coastal Bluff, Mesa Restoration
Support for all, including fill removal.

Northwestern Lowlands / Sandbar Willow... 2nd paragraph, Pg. 74

"Vegetation...frequently obstructs flow between ponds, reducing conveyance below design levels. To address this, the City annually removes emergent vegetation..."

Recommendation: We support structural improvements to reduce ongoing maintenance costs and issues with the system.

Trail Map, Pg. 75

We prefer keeping the canyon trail closed as habitat has rebounded and covered the trail during its closure. CCA prefers not to have middle mesa cut-through trail bisecting habitat due to fragmentation and species impacts. Having a core habitat area supports local species and improves ecosystem functionality.

Habitat Restoration & Enhancement, Pg. 78

We agree with the description of Costa Mesa's role as stewards, the representation of community intent, and all goals listed. We appreciate the use of 'low-impact' recreation here, instead of 'passive' recreation. We hope this language will be adopted consistently throughout the Plan.

Other Management Opportunities, Pg. 81

CCA supports the potential for City managed, site-wide ongoing invasive plant and animal management. That said, more funding is needed.

CCA believes a potential partnership with the City, CCA, and OCME could exist. Its focus would be to accomplish Other Management Opportunity 4, for invasive removal, grow space establishment, and native planting in/among the model railroad area, to include education for Park and train visitors on native habitats and restoration.

Strategic Habitat Restoration Project Opportunities, Pg. 82-85

Support all of Project 1, except in Objectives 1f and 1g, please do not use synthetic polymers or resin binding agents in trail materials, or plastic fiber glass (trex) materials for the boardwalk that will break down petroleum products and chemical byproducts into the habitat. Further, we support all of Projects 2-9 and provide special support for Objectives 6d and 7a.

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Existing Fill Soil Removal, Pg. 87

Support for the removal of improper fill, and restoration of habitat on native soil.

Erosion Control Measures, Pg. 89-90

Support for taking measures to stem human-accelerated erosion. However, please do not use plastic materials, including vinyl, as these materials do not biodegrade and will break down into smaller and smaller pieces, out into the ambient environment, the watershed, the ocean, and ultimately in the bodies of plants and animals. Please avoid plastic in all work and program elements.

Recommendation: Consider building a wood structure that functions the same, and will biodegrade after reinforcing root systems are established.

Proposed or Modified Drainage Patterns, Pg. 91

Support for developing riparian habitat in the drainage area.

Question: Where will water go at the end of the drainage system? Can it go back to the Greenville-Banning Channel?

Security, Pg. 92

Support for not adding more security lighting and if it is required, to meet Dark Sky requirements to reduce nighttime impacts to wildlife.

Recommendation: Please ensure security lighting at the train station and maintenance yard complies with Dark Sky and pollinator friendly lighting: motion sensing, semi-dim amber lights with hoods at the top to direct light downward.

Chapter 07 - Implementation

Design Guidelines, Pg. 96, 98

Support for all recommendations with the following caveats on **page 98**:

- Benches: consider all-concrete benches with eco-friendly mixtures without sealants or binders prone to outgassing. If stained wood, please use Zero-VOC, petroleum free products.
- **Lighting (all):** Please apply all Dark Sky standards (see previous comment).

- **Materials:** Prefer non-toxic concrete to asphalt, avoid chemical-stabilized DG, and composite materials for boardwalks. Use natural materials which do not disrupt ecosystems.

Trail Map, Pg. 97

Please remove/decommission the Canyon Trail. It has grown over with native habitat during its closure, and adjacent trails offer great alternatives. CCA prefers not to have the trail cutting through the middle of the mesa loop, to keep habitat contiguity and create a core habitat zone with limited fragmentation.

Site Activity and Uses Map, Pg. 99

CCA supports the dense planting recommendations to help trail delineation. We oppose additional tree planting. If the City must plant more trees, we recommend choosing native trees. The proposed Pollinator Garden should contain native plants only.

Pg. 100

Park Structures

CCA supports developing the East side grow space and maintenance & storage facility.

Entrance

CCA hopes for invasive species control and replacement of ornamentals with native plants.

Parking Lots

Donated trees should be locally native-only, but kept at a minimum as too many trees outside of habitat can upset ecological balance at this site.

Removal of Improper Fill Soils

We support fill removal and re-vegetation with native plant communities.

CCA supports the 2025 Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update as an excellent update to the existing Fairview Park Master Plans. It properly builds upon the existing foundation, while updating plans with updated scientific understanding. We agree with the many entities, scientists, Tribes, committees, residents, adopted City plans, and State and Federal resource agencies and laws, who prove the ecological importance of the site. The habitats should be

protected as a first priority, and high-impact human activities should be strictly prohibited in high value ecological areas.

Thank you for taking the time to review this letter. We appreciate the extensive work provided on this document and hope the Council supports ensuring the unique species that call this area home are supported appropriately through implementable and actionable items. As someone who enjoys riding my bike throughout Fairview Park, it concerns me that the current draft of the Fairview Master Plan will change the way residents of Costa Mesa and the surrounding community will interact with the park. I do not support the current draft of the Fairview Park Master Plan. Please make major changes so the community can continue long-standing uses at Fairview Park. The plan should explicitly preserve the model glider field in its current location, concerts at the park, bicycle and dog walking trail access, and the Goat Hill Junction Railroad, and direct staff to work with resource agencies and HSS together and promptly on a mitigation approach that allows these uses to continue safely and compliantly.

I also do not support any fencing that reduces public access. Any revision should honor the community's intent behind Measure AA and preserve the park's existing open and shared character. An exclusionary master plan update for the purpose of securing future grant funding or satisfying one special interest group should be avoided.

Fairview Park should stay a shared space that protects wildlife and maintains open space for all people, families, and community activities.

Dear Brenda Green:

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) has reviewed the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update (Plan) and associated technical reports from the City of Costa Mesa (City). Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments and recommendations to the City Council regarding those activities that may affect California fish and wildlife. Likewise, CDFW appreciates the opportunity to provide comments regarding those aspects of the Plan that CDFW, by law, may be required to carry out or approve through the exercise of its own regulatory authority under the Fish and Game Code.

CDFW ROLE

CDFW is California's Trustee Agency for fish and wildlife resources and holds those resources in trust by statute for all the people of the State, pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and CEQA Guidelines¹(Fish & Game Code, §§ 711.7, subd. (a) & 1802; Pub. Resources Code, § 21070; CEQA Guidelines § 15386, subd. (a)). CDFW, in its trustee capacity, has jurisdiction over the conservation, protection, and management of fish, wildlife, native plants, and habitat necessary for biologically sustainable populations of those species (Fish & G. Code, § 1802). Similarly, for purposes of CEQA, CDFW is charged by law to provide, as available, biological expertise during public agency environmental review efforts, focusing specifically on projects and related activities that have the potential to adversely affect fish and wildlife resources.

CDFW may also act as a Responsible Agency under CEQA. (Pub. Resources Code, § 21069; CEQA Guidelines, § 15381). CDFW expects that it may need to exercise regulatory authority as provided by the Fish and Game Code. As proposed, for example, the Project may be subject to CDFW's lake and streambed alteration regulatory authority (Fish & G. Code, § 1600 et seq.). Likewise, to the extent

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implementation of the Project as proposed may result in "take" as defined by State law² of any species protected under the California Endangered Species Act (CESA; Fish & G. Code, § 2050 et seq.) or the Native Plant Protection Act (NPPA; Fish & G. Code, §1900 et seq.), the City may seek related take authorization as provided by the Fish and Game Code.

CDFW also administers the Natural Community Conservation Planning (NCCP) program, a California regional habitat conservation planning program (Fish & G. Code, § 2800 et seq.). The City is a participating landowner under the Central/Coastal Orange County NCCP/Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP).

PLAN DESCRIPTION SUMMARY

Objective: According to the Fairview Park Master Plan Update (Plan), the essential purpose of updating the Plan is to reflect the vested interests of the community and the City to balance resource protection and public use. The Plan update aims to address critical needs for a Long-term Management Plan that conserves cultural and biological resources, including rare vernal pool habitats. It outlines goals to protect, preserve, and enhance natural resources through community education, stewardship, and management of the park for passive recreational uses (i.e. walking, running, walking of leashed dogs, flying glider planes, model railroading, flying kites, picnics, and other small group functions). From a natural resources perspective, the Plan will incorporate updated biological assessments with an assessment of current land uses considering recent changes in state environmental regulations/policies. It will be a foundational document for planning, habitat restoration, wetland and riparian habitat remediation, and long-term habitat management. A Trails Plan will also be adopted in association with the Plan.

Location: Fairview Park is in the City, and its address is 2525 Placentia Avenue. It is bordered by residential areas to the north and east, Talbert Regional Park to the south, and the Santa Ana River to the west. The park itself is bisected by Placentia Avenue, which runs north/south.

Biological Setting: The regional biological significance of Fairview Park cannot be overstated. The Park is the northernmost parcel of a rare, contiguous undeveloped natural open space, which stretches from Fairview Park southward through Talbert Regional Park and terminates at the Randall Preserve. The 208-acre, topographically diverse Park contains a multitude of habitat types and micro-habitats, including one of the last coastal terrace vernal pools complexes in Orange County (USFWS 2007) on its mesa. Vernal pools in Fairview Park also support several plant species that are locally rare (City 2008 and Chung 2010). The artificial ponds in the lowlands provide nesting and foraging habitat for riparian species. Other natural and sensitive habitats include

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native grasslands, coastal bluff scrub, alluvial scrub, riparian woodlands, and coastal sage scrub. These habitats serve as foraging and reproductive habitat, providing refugia for many sensitive species in an otherwise developed watershed. Approximately 12-acres of the Park are landscaped.

According to the Biological Technical Report (BTR; Hamilton Biological 2025), 222 vascular plants and over 262 wildlife species have been documented in the Park, a remarkable number of flora and fauna for an area with just under 200 acres of habitat. Several listed species have been observed on site or have high or moderate potential to occur on site which include:

Invertebrates

- San Diego fairy shrimp (Branchinecta sandiegonensis; Endangered Species Act
- (ESA)-listed endangered).
- Crotch's bumble bee (Bombus crotchii; CESA Candidate for Threatened or
- Endangered Listing; CBB),

Birds

- Coastal California gnatcatcher [Polioptila californica californica; ESA- listed
- threatened; CDFW Species of Special Concern (SSC); gnatcatcher],
- Least Bell's vireo (Vireo bellii pusillus; ESA-listed endangered; CESA-listed
- endangered; vireo),
- White-tailed kite (Elanus leucurus; CDFW Fully Protected Species),
- Belding's Savannah sparrow (Passerculus sandwichensis beldingi; CESA-listed
- endangered).
- Western burrowing owl (Athene cunicularia; SSC; CESA Candidate for
- Threatened or Endangered Listing).
- Coastal cactus wren (Campylorhynchus brunneicapillus sandiegensis; SSC),
- Coopers hawk (Astur cooperii; SSC),

Plants

- San Diego button celery (Eryngium aristulatum var. parishii; CESA-listed Endangered, California Native Plant Society Rare Plant Rank 1B.1), and,
- Southern tarplant (*Centromadia parrryi ssp. australis*; California Native Plant Society Rare Plant Rank 1B.1).

Prior CDFW Engagement: CDFW has a long history of engaging with the City on natural resources matters at Fairview Park, most notably vernal pool complex management issues, historic violations, and ongoing impacts to areas subject to Fish and Game Code 1600 et seq. Additionally, fulfillment of outstanding mitigation obligations regarding compensatory mitigation obligations at Fairview Park for off-site projects with the Orange County Transportation Authority (OCTA), the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE), and the Department of Toxic Substances Control continue to languish and remain incomplete (OCTA 2018 and CDFW 2019). While we appreciate that our working partnership appears to be gradually improving, our attempts to

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partner with the City on these outstanding issues have been largely ineffective. As outlined below, many of these obligations are incomplete or their status is unknown.

In 2014, CDFW partnered with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to provide comments on vernal pool restoration after the installation of a path in the Park that was routed within and adjacent to vernal pools occupied by the federally endangered San Diego fairy shrimp (USFWS 2014). Impacts to these pools from the installation of paths and parking areas, improvements to Estancia High School stadium, and the operation of motorized vehicles during the wet season were mitigated through restoration efforts at pools 2, 5, 6, and 7 (Glen Lukos Associates 2015). It is unclear to CDFW and the USFWS (hereafter referred to as the Wildlife Agencies) as to whether the stated mitigation and restoration efforts were achieved in full.

In 2016, CDFW investigated the City's fill of Little Canyon as a possible violation of Fish and Game Code, section 1602, when soil stockpiles from the artificial pond creation were used to fill Little Canyon for purposes of trail creation and realignment. CDFW concluded the unauthorized activities were subject to Fish and Game Code; however, the statute of limitations to issue a Notice of Violation had passed and no action was taken (City 2015).

In 2018, the City contacted CDFW regarding clearing of vegetation in and around the artificial pond complex during the nesting season for coastal California gnatcatcher. At that time, CDFW communicated that a Routine Maintenance Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement (LSAA) per our Lake and Streambed Alteration program was required to move forward with the clearing. To date the City does not have a Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement to authorize the work in those areas (Comment 3). On October 8, 2025, after CDFW issued a comment letter on the Plan Update's technical documents (CDFW 2025), the City and CDFW met to discuss the City's progress regarding their Incomplete notification for a Routine Maintenance LSAA. In that meeting, the City reaffirmed their commitment to providing a complete notification for their LSAA in early 2026.

In 2019, the Wildlife Agencies and OCTA met with the City several times to discuss their outstanding mitigation obligations to OCTA and ACOE (OCTA 2018). Since our comment letter on the Plan Update's technical documents (CDFW 2025) was issued, the City has adopted the Flower Fields Restoration Project, which will restore habitat and satisfy outstanding mitigation obligations to OCTA (Comment 7).

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

CDFW offers the comments and recommendations below to assist the City in finalizing the Plan and strengthening the stated goals; namely, aligning the existing Plan with current biological assessments, land uses, and environmental regulations and policies, while adequately identifying and/or mitigating the Plan's significant, or potentially significant, direct and indirect impacts on fish and wildlife (biological) resources.

1. **Fly Field Relocation.** In alignment with the Wildlife Agencies' recommendation, and the recommendations of many other natural resources-focused entities, the fly field

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relocation represents a well-considered and balanced approach to habitat protection and recreation. CDFW strongly supports the relocation because it places fly field and glider operations within an already developed and actively used recreation area, well separated from the highly rare and sensitive vernal pool complex. This will substantially reduce the potential for unauthorized trail creation, fully avoid vernal pool habitat degradation, and minimize likelihood unauthorized take of state and/or federally listed species that reside on the Mesa.

The relocation and reduced maintenance activities within the vernal pool complex are a proactive step toward long-term species and habitat protection, regulatory compliance, and responsible recreation planning; this is in part because the Plan commits to restoring vernal pools and removing fill soils from the northern part of the Mesa. A portion of the Mesa restoration will include coastal sage scrub and flower fields to fulfill mitigation obligations, improve conditions for native wildlife, and reinforce the City's commitment to the Master Plan (at pp. 71, City of Costa Mesa, 2025). Importantly, the Plan's objectives for *Strategic Habitat Restoration Project 1. Mesa Habitat Restoration and Indigenous Village Site Protection* (pp. 82, City of Costa Mesa, 2025) specifically call for elimination of incompatible uses such as mowing within the vernal pool complex. Relocation of the fly field directly supports these objectives by removing maintenance activities that currently threaten and degrade sensitive vernal pool habitat.

- 2. CESA Candidate Species. CDFW emphasizes that the fly field relocation is the biologically superior option and represents a dramatically lower regulatory burden for the City, in that impacts to CESA-listed and CESA candidate species would be smaller, and mitigation requirements associated with authorized incidental take would be significantly lower. Additionally, relocation would avoid the necessity to notify CDFW under Fish and Game Code section 1600 et seq. and avoid the need for consultation with the USFWS for San Diego fairy shrimp. However, based on recent survey data brought to CDFW's attention, operation and maintenance of the fly field in its new location may still require take authorization under CESA.
 - a. Western burrowing owl. According to the California Natural Diversity Database (CNDDB, Online Field Survey Form), there is a 2020 occurrence record of a western burrowing owl adjacent to the proposed fly field. Creation, use, and maintenance of the new fly field location may disturb, distress, or lead to take of individual western burrowing owls.

On October 15, 2024, the Fish and Game Commission published a Notice of Findings that designates western burrowing owl as a CESA candidate species. As a candidate species, western burrowing owls are granted full protection of a threatened or endangered species under CESA. If any activities could result in take, appropriate CESA authorization (i.e., Incidental Take Permit under Fish and Game Code section 2081 or Restoration Management Permit under Fish and Game Code section 1670 *et seq.*) should be obtained prior to commencement of Project activities. Take of any endangered, threatened, or candidate species that results from the Project is prohibited, except as authorized by State law (Fish &

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- G. Code, §§ 86, 1670, 2062, 2067, 2068, 2080, 2085; Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 786.9). Take of individual burrowing owls and their nests is defined by Fish and Game Code section 86, and prohibited by sections 3503, 3503.5 and 3513.
- b. Crotch's bumble bee. Creation, use, and maintenance of the fly field could also impact Crotch's bumble bee or floristic resources upon which the species relies. Crotch's bumble bee often nests underground, sometimes occupying abandoned rodent burrows along with many other microhabitats (Hatfield et al., 2015). If Crotch's bumble bee are using burrows on the relocation site for nesting, direct impacts could result from ground-disturbing activities, which could lead to death or injury of adults, eggs, and larva, burrow collapse, nest abandonment, and reduced nest success. Indirect impacts may occur from loss of foraging resources.

The California Fish and Game Commission accepted a petition to list the Crotch's bumble bee as threatened or endangered under CESA, determining the listing "may be warranted" and advancing the species to the candidacy stage of the CESA listing process. Crotch's bumble bee is granted full protection under CESA. Take of any endangered, threatened, candidate species that results from the Project is prohibited, except as authorized by State law (Fish & G. Code, §§ 86, 2062, 2067, 2068, 2080, 2085; Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, § 786.9). In addition, Crotch's bumble bee has a State ranking of S1/S2. This means that Crotch's bumble bee is considered critically imperiled or imperiled and is extremely rare (often five or fewer populations). Crotch's bumble bee is also listed as an invertebrate of conservation priority under the California Terrestrial and Vernal Pool Invertebrates of Conservation Priority List (CDFW 2024).

CDFW welcomes coordination with the City to determine if take authorization can be circumvented at the relocation site through modifications in the proposed design, based upon avoidance of suitable habitat.

3. **CESA-Listed Species.** Fairview Park contains multiple records of CESA-listed species, including least Bell's vireo, Belding's savannah sparrow, and San Diego button celery. CDFW considers adverse impacts to a species protected by CESA to be significant. Take of any endangered, threatened, candidate species, or NPPAlisted plant species that results from the Project is prohibited, except as authorized by state law (Fish & G. Code §§ 1670, 2080, 2085; Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14, §786.9). Consequently, if the Project or any Project-related activity will result in take of a species designated as endangered or threatened, or a candidate for listing under CESA, CDFW recommends that the Project proponent seek appropriate take authorization under CESA prior to implementing the Project. Appropriate authorization from CDFW may include an Incidental Take Permit (ITP), Restoration Management Permit (RMP) or a consistency determination in certain circumstances, among other options (Fish & G. Code, §§ 1670, 2080.1, 2081, subds. (b) and (c)). Early consultation is encouraged, as significant modification to a future project and mitigation measures may be required to obtain a CESA Permit. To ensure CDFW will be able to use the Master Plan and associated CEQA document for the issuance Brenda Green City of Costa Mesa November 13, 2025 Page 7 of 11

of any CESA-issued permits, the Plan's CEQA document should address all future project impacts to CESA-listed species and specify a mitigation, monitoring, and reporting program that will meet the requirements of an ITP or RMP.

- 4. Cutting the Green Tape Program. CDFW acknowledges the City's continued work to restore and manage natural resources within Fairview Park and recognizes the City's efforts to advance several restoration initiatives under the draft Master Plan Update. As such, we encourage the City to leverage our Cutting the Green Tape Program where appropriate. A Restoration Management Permit (RMP) issued through the Cutting the Green Tape Program provides a unified, efficient CDFW permitting mechanism for restoration, enhancement, and species recovery projects that simplifies the permitting process while maintaining strong species and habitat protection measures. The RMP provides up to five separate CDFW authorizations in a single permit designed for beneficial management, recovery, and restoration activities: 1) take of CESA threatened, endangered, or candidate species; 2) take of Fully Protected Species; 3) take of plant species designated as "rare" under the NPPA; 4) take of other species including mammals, birds, fish, amphibians, or reptiles; and 5) authorization of impacts to rivers, streams, and lakes that would otherwise be subject to a Lake or Streambed Alteration Agreement, More information on this program can be found at Cutting the Green Tape³.
- 5. **Wetland Impacts.** CDFW appreciates the efforts to include the vernal pool complex as subject to Fish and Game Code section 1600 *et seq.* (pp. 27, City of Costa Mesa, 2025). For any such activities, the Project applicant (or "entity") must provide written notification to CDFW pursuant to section 1600 et seq. of the Fish and Game Code. Based on this notification and other information, CDFW determines whether a Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement (LSAA) with the applicant is required prior to conducting the proposed activities. CDFW's issuance of an LSAA for a Project that is subject to CEQA will require CEQA compliance actions by CDFW as a Responsible Agency. To minimize additional requirements by CDFW pursuant to section 1600 et seq. and/or under CEQA, the Plan should fully identify the potential impacts to the stream or riparian resources and provide adequate avoidance, mitigation, monitoring, and reporting commitments for issuance of the LSAA. CDFW recommends the Applicant submit a Lake and Streambed Alteration Notification to CDFW. Notifications can be submitted through CDFW's Environmental Permit Information Management System (EPIMS)⁴.
- 6. **Trail Design.** The Trails Plan provided in the larger Plan Update appropriately emphasizes connected habitats, removing unauthorized trails, and reducing human intrusion within sensitive habitats. It also distinguishes between primary and secondary pedestrian trails. These secondary pedestrian trails are redundant recreation paths that further fragment the sensitive habitats throughout the park.

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CDFW recommends the following items in the Trails Plan are resolved prior to adopting the Plan Update:

- a. The Trails Plan proposes constructing an elevated boardwalk along the existing trail that runs diagonally from the north terminus of Canyon Drive southwest to Pacific Avenue. While CDFW agrees that an elevated boardwalk could provide protection for the vernal pool complex, the Trails Plan figure does not delineate where the proposed boardwalk would be located, nor does it clearly correspond with the Trail Type/Mode of Travel table (pp. 97-98, City of Costa Mesa, 2025). Based on the text description, the boardwalk appears to have a "primary pedestrian trail" designation, but this is not clearly depicted in the figure. Per the Habitat Restoration Opportunities figure (pp. 60, City of Costa Mesa, 2025), the proposed boardwalk would overlap the Vernal Pool 4 Restoration (2002 to 2009).
- b. A secondary pedestrian trail is currently proposed to bisect the vernal pool complex immediately adjacent to Vernal Pool 1 Restoration, per the Habitat Restoration Opportunities figure (pp. 60, City of Costa Mesa, 2025). It can be assumed that this specific trail would be fenced using low-disturbance methods such as gabion baskets or stacked wood fencing to minimize ground disturbance and prevent soil penetration within the vernal pool watershed. However, these fencing methods provide less certainty in keeping trail users on designated paths and out of sensitive habitats. Additionally, the table does not specify the materials nor surface treatments for this specific trail. If the trail is not struck from the Trails Plan, these specifics should be added.
- c. Given the sensitivity of the vernal pool complex and the potential for off-trail intrusion, CDFW recommends that the secondary pedestrian trail bisecting the Mesa be eliminated from the Trail Plan and that other secondary trails be reduced to the greatest extent possible. Secondary pedestrian trails are also sited throughout the Wetlands and Riparian Phase 2 (OCTA) (2012 to Present) site and the Community-Led Coastal Sage Scrub (CSS) Restoration (On-going) site, per the Habitat Restoration Opportunities figure (pp. 60, City of Costa Mesa, 2025).
- d. Wildlife Agency approved Fairview Park CSS and Flower Fields Habitat Restoration and Monitoring Plan. The Trail Plan as currently designed may authorize trails that will significantly bisect and cause indirect effects to the future CSS and Flower Fields Restoration Project (Land IQ, 2024). In the absence of a clearly defined and enforceable public access management program, the potential for habitat disturbance remains high. The City should provide further discussion of the proposed means to enforce pedestrian access restrictions and ensure long-term protection of sensitive biological resources.
- e. The Trails Plan should include an inventory and mapping of all existing authorized and unauthorized trails, access points, and areas of sensitive biological resources.

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- 7. Enforcement. CDFW appreciates that the Plan discusses the need for increased park ranger presence and enforcement efforts; however, the Plan does not reference specific regulations, enforcement mechanisms, nor management actions that will achieve this objective. Without clearly defined operation protocols, staffing commitments, or regulatory measures (such as posted restrictions, penalties, or monitoring programs), it remains uncertain how the City intends to ensure compliance and effectively deter unauthorized trail creation and unauthorized vehicle access. The Plan should include a more detailed description of enforcement strategies and corresponding resources allocations to demonstrate the City's capacity to maintain long-term protection of sensitive habitats and recreational infrastructure.
- 8. **OCTA Mitigation Obligations.** The Fairview Park Mesa Restoration Project was nominated by the City in 2010 for funding consideration from the OCTA. Upon completion and Wildlife Agency approval, the restored habitat will be eligible for use by OCTA as mitigation credits under the OCTA Measure 2 NCCP/HCP, contingent upon establishment of a recorded conservation easement or other approved conservation mechanism to ensure the long-term protection of the site.

The Plan's current objectives for the *Strategic Habitat Restoration Projects* (pp. 84, City of Costa Mesa, 2025) directly advance fulfillment of the City's outstanding obligations to OCTA and demonstrate renewed commitment to successful restoration outcomes. Notably, the City's adoption of the CSS and Flower Fields Restoration Project represents meaningful progress in implementing the City's restoration vision. CDFW acknowledges the City's coordination with the Cutting the Green Tape initiative to streamline permitting and regulatory alignment for these efforts. We look forward to working with the City to complete a conservation easement to fulfill the City's obligations under the original Restoration Project. Establishing this instrument will ensure the perpetual protection and management of restored habitats and allow OCTA to apply the resulting credits toward their mitigation obligations.

CDFW remains committed to working collaboratively with the City and OCTA to authorize restoration projects that demonstrate sustained ecological uplift, consistent with state conservation priorities and the goals of the existing OCTA Measure 2 NCCP/HCP. We look forward to advancing a complete Restoration Management Permit application package to facilitate timely implementation of these future projects.

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CONCLUSION

CDFW appreciates the opportunity to comment on the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update to advise the City of Costa Mesa in identifying and mitigating the Master Plan's impacts on biological resources. Dear Mr. Mejia:

This letter has been prepared by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) to provide the City of Costa Mesa (City) with information on the actions needed to restore, protect, and manage vernal pool habitat and associated species within the City at Fairview Park, Orange County, California. This information is provided in response to: (1) the installation of a path in Fairview Park that was routed within and adjacent to vernal pools occupied by the federally endangered San Diego fairy shrimp (*Branchinecta sandiegonensis*), (2) your written request received September 4, 2013, for our review of restoration alternatives for vernal pools impacted by the installation of the path (LSA 2013), and (3) recommendations provided by Finium Environmental (2013) following removal of the path. Although the City's primary focus is on restoration of vernal pools impacted by the path, this letter includes actions the Service considers necessary to protect all vernal pool habitat and associated species within Fairview Park. This letter addresses future actions the City may take; it does not address or resolve issues relating to past actions, including the path construction, or the "take" of listed species associated with those past actions. This letter does not constitute authorization for future "take" of listed species.

Background




Figure 1. Location of vernal pool basins at Fairview Park. Source: Michael Brandman Associated (1995) and Fairview Master Plan (November 2002 revision).

San Diego fairy shrimp were first identified in Fairview Park in 1994 (Michael Brandman Associates 1995), 3 years prior to the Federal listing of the species (62 FR 4933). Seven vernal pool basins (numbered 1 through 7) and a "vernal marsh" were delineated in 1995 (Michael Brandman and Associates 1995) (Figure 1). San Diego fairy shrimp have since been identified in all but Basin 7

¹ Section 9 of the Endangered Species Act and associated regulations prohibit the take of endangered and threatened species without special exemption. Take is defined as to harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, collect, or to attempt to engage in any such conduct. Harm is further defined by the Fish and Wildlife Service to include significant habitat modification or degradation that results in death or injury to listed species by significantly impairing essential behavior patterns, including breeding, feeding, or sheltering.

(City 2008, Appendix C, Simovich 2005). Three additional vernal pools were observed in Fairview Park, east of Placentia Avenue in 2002 (Glenn Lukos 2002 in LSA 2007). To our knowledge, no surveys for fairy shrimp have been completed in these pools.

Restoration projects to improve the quality of habitat for San Diego fairy shrimp and sensitive plant species were completed in Fairview Park as mitigation for impacts to U.S. Army Corps of Engineers jurisdictional waters of the United States (Michael Brandman Associates 2002; Glenn Lukos Associates 2006). As a result of these projects, Basins 1, 2, and 3 were combined (Restored Basin 1), and Basin 4 and the "vernal marsh" were restored into a vernal pool complex (Restored Complex 4).




Figure 2. Vernal pools in Fairview Park during an above average rainfall year (facing south). Paths bisect the basins in several locations, and the fencing is in the water. Photo source: http://www.savefairviewpark.org/documents/fpcac-pack-5-29-13.zip. Labels added.

In above average rainfall years, it is likely that the watersheds of Restored Basin 1 and Restored Complex 4 are connected across the path that artificially separates the watersheds (Figure 2). It is also likely that Basins 5, 6, and 7 are part of a vernal pool complex with a shared hydrological connection during high rainfall years. Monitoring during previous restoration efforts identified the connection between Basins 5 and 6 (Michael Brandman Associates 2002), and the boundary between the watersheds of Basin 5 and 7 was coincident with a row of logs that have since been removed (Finium Environmental 2013).

Fairview Park supports one of the last coastal terrace vernal pools complexes in Orange County (Service 2007). Conservation and management of the San Diego fairy shrimp and its habitat in Fairview Park and other vernal pool complexes in the Los Angeles Basin-Orange Management Area is one of the criteria identified for recovery of the San Diego fairy shrimp in the Service's Recovery Plan for Vernal Pools of Southern California (Service 1998). Vernal pools in Fairview Park also support several plant species that are locally rare (City 2008; Chung 2010).

In the past, the City has supported restoration of the vernal pools and other sensitive habitat in Fairview Park, and the Fairview Park Master Plan (City 2008) includes a commitment that "the pools and basins [in Fairview Park] are to be retained, restored, and protected." Specific actions in the plan anticipated to benefit the San Diego fairy shrimp include, but are not limited to: (1) restoration of vernal pool habitat; (2) development of a formalized path system to avoid sensitive areas to the extent feasible; (3) installation of educational signage and observation platforms in the vernal pool restoration area; (4) installation of fencing to protect the vernal pools; and (5) cessation of mowing within the vernal pools or, if necessary, mowing only late in the season after annual forbs and grasses have set seed.

We agree that the general measures identified in the Master Plan are appropriate to maintain the vernal pools. We are concerned, however, that some measures have not been implemented and others have been implemented in ways that may have impacted the San Diego fairy shrimp. More specific details are needed to ensure that the San Diego fairy shrimp and its habitat are protected. Activities that may have impacted or have the potential to impact the San Diego fairy shrimp and its habitat at Fairview Park include the following:

Installation of paths and parking areas: A path was installed in late 2013 that may have resulted in direct and indirect impacts to San Diego fairy shrimp, as described in our letter, dated November 14, 2013 (13B0443-14TA0039). While the path has been removed, grading associated with path installation altered the hydrology of the watershed supporting Basins 5 and 6 so that water may not pond to the extent it did historically (Finium Environmental 2013). As a result, fairy shrimp cysts may not hatch to their historical capacities until changes in topography are corrected (Finium Environmental 2013). The portion of the watershed supporting Basin 7 (including the basin area) has been used as a temporary parking area, and logs were placed in the watershed to delineate the parking boundary. A portion of the watershed of Restored Complex 4 was impacted by the installation of permanent parking along Canyon Drive. Grading for the parking area changed the topography so that water now ponds in the parking area (Figure 2).

<u>Improvements to Estancia High School Stadium:</u> The installation of fencing and a field events area impacted a significant portion of the watershed area supporting Basin 6 and altered the hydrology by re-grading the site. The changes in topography may limit the potential for the City to restore the basin within the boundaries of Fairview Park.

<u>Pedestrians, dogs, and bicycles:</u> While substantial resources have been focused on restoring and protecting Restored Basin 1, the unfenced northern end has informal paths leading directly into the basin and allowing bicycle access. Bicycle tracks and paths encroach within the northern end of the basin. Because the fencing was installed only around the restored basin area, the paths leading to the boardwalk are within the watershed of the basin. In January 2011 (an above average rainfall year), it was apparent that several paths and the fence are located in the basin (Figure 2). Restored Complex 4 has multiple paths running through it and shows signs of frequent use by dogs.

Operation of motorized vehicles during the wet season: In Restored Complex 4, deep tire tracks are evident due to motorized vehicle encroachment when the basins were inundated. The deep tracks may have altered the hydrology of the basins by causing water to pool first in the tracks, potentially concentrating fairy shrimp cysts within smaller portions of each basin.

<u>Installation of landscaping and associated irrigation systems</u>: Ornamental landscaping and turf areas border Basins 5 and 6 to the north, south, and east. Irrigation systems installed to support the landscaping are contributing to conversion of the vegetation communities within the watershed where water is now available throughout the year. The perennial water source is supporting wetland species such as mulefat (*Baccharis salicifolia*), curly dock (*Rumex crispus*), and sedges (*Cyperus* sp.) (Finium Environmental 2013). The conversion of the vernal pool habitat to wetland can result in the permanent loss of habitat for San Diego fairy shrimp.

Mowing and pesticide and herbicide application: We have little information regarding the current timing and location of mowing activities or the application of pesticides and herbicides, but these activities have the potential to impact San Diego fairy shrimp and their habitat. Mowing equipment can crush cysts, spread invasive plant species, and cause ruts if mowing is conducted when the ground is damp. Pesticides and herbicides could potentially harm San Diego fairy shrimp cysts and adults.

Restoration, protection, and management of vernal pools in Fairview Park


While accommodating public uses within Fairview Park, it is the City's responsibility to ensure that its actions comply with the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (Act), as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.). In consideration of the degraded condition and management needs of the vernal pool habitat within Fairview Park, implementation by the City of the following measures would help ensure that the San Diego fairy shrimp population within the coastal terrace vernal pools at Fairview Park remains viable. Some of these restoration actions can be implemented immediately without further authorization under the Act, but others have the potential to result in take of listed species for which additional authorization under the Act would be required. To ensure that the City's future actions are appropriately authorized under the Act, we recommend that the City coordinate closely with our office to ensure that any incidental take associated with these actions is appropriately exempted under the Act. As indicated above, this letter does not exempt future take of listed species.

The following measures apply to Restored Basin 1, Restored Complex 4, and the vernal pool complex consisting of Basins 5, 6, and 7.

- 1. Watershed Restoration Prepare and implement a restoration plan to address damages to the hydrological function of the vernal pool watersheds. The plan should be prepared by a biologist with a minimum of 5 years of experience restoring vernal pools in southern California and should identify actions that are necessary to restore hydrological function to the vernal pools. The plan should be reviewed and approved by the Service prior to implementation. Measures that should be included in the restoration plan include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Corrections to the watershed topography, as necessary, to ensure the basins will pond for a sufficient duration during an average rainfall year to support the life history of the San Diego fairy shrimp.
 - b. Management of the irrigation systems to prevent runoff from entering the watershed of Basins 5, 6, and 7. The City should coordinate with Newport-Mesa Unified School

District to ensure irrigation supporting landscaping at Estancia High School Stadium does not enter Fairview Park. We are available to assist the City with this coordination, as necessary.

- c. Removal of landscaping, turf, and non-vernal pool associated wetland plants (e.g., mulefat, curly dock) that were supported by irrigation systems in the watersheds and replacement with appropriate native vegetation.
- d. Removal of non-native plant species (e.g., annual grasslands and mustards) if needed to re-establish hydrological function.
- e. Restoration of native vegetation around the vernal pool basins and along informal and unauthorized paths, as appropriate (e.g., outside the basin area).
- f. Removal of trash or other debris from the vernal pool watershed.
- 2. <u>Permanent Protection</u> Record a conservation easement over the vernal pool basins and watersheds. Consistent with the Fairview Park Master Plan, the conservation easement should provide for the protection of the San Diego fairy shrimp and its habitat while allowing appropriate public access and enjoyment of the park.
- 3. Fencing and Paths The Service generally recommends fencing a sufficiently large habitat buffer (i.e., at least 100 feet from the outer edge of the watershed in most cases) to reduce encroachment by pedestrians and off-road vehicles, trash accumulation and dumping, and other indirect effects of development (Service 2008). A large buffer is necessary to account for natural changes in the basin dimensions over time in response to varying hydrological conditions and to prevent alterations to the watershed that could impact the duration and extent of ponding. To ensure the watersheds in Fairview Park are protected, the fencing should limit entry to the majority of the watershed area. Pets should be kept on leash in the park to prevent entry into fenced areas. Formal paths that will pass through the watershed of vernal pools should be placed on boardwalks, above the water surface elevation of the basins, to minimize changes in hydrology and the introduction of contaminants into the basins. Suggested locations for fencing are provided for discussion purposes (Figure 3).
- 4. Public Education The Service would like to partner with the City to develop educational materials and signs that can highlight the importance of biological resources in Fairview Park. The preservation of remaining coastal terrace pools in the City of Costa Mesa should be considered a source of pride for the City and its citizens. Educational signs, located along primary access routes (e.g., Figure 3), can help to enhance and contribute to the public's use and enjoyment of the vernal pool area. A "nature path" with stopping points where users can learn more about vernal pools and the plants and animals they support can highlight species that are not readily seen and can maintain a public awareness of the rarity of these biological resources for generations to come.



- 5. <u>Trash</u> Provide trash receptacles and pet waste stations in convenient locations to minimize the potential for trash to be discarded in the vernal pool watersheds.
- 6. Mowing, Weed Control, and Pesticide Use Mowing should be conducted outside the limits of the vernal pool basins to avoid direct impacts to San Diego fairy shrimp. In addition, we recommend that mowing be restricted within approximately 50 feet of the basin area to avoid restored habitat and sensitive plant species surrounding the basin area. The mowing limits should be periodically reevaluated to compensate for changes in the size and location of the basin area and corresponding zone of sensitive plant species. Please coordinate with the Service regarding use of pesticides and herbicides within the vernal pool watersheds to ensure chemicals harmful to San Diego fairy shrimp are avoided.
- 7. <u>Employee Education</u> Provide an on-site education program for current and new employees of the City that will have assigned duties in Fairview Park to review sensitive biological resource areas and the City's responsibilities for management of these areas.
- 8. <u>Patrol</u> Include as part of regular patrol duties, inspection of the fencing surrounding the watersheds and reporting of any damage to the fences or signs of encroachment within the fenced boundary.
- 9. <u>Biological Monitoring</u> Regular biological monitoring is necessary to determine the efficacy of management measures to preserve and protect the San Diego fairy shrimp. Biological monitoring should include:
 - a. Annual watershed inspection A biologist who has experience with San Diego fairy shrimp and its habitat should prepare a brief summary of the status of the habitat and a list of any additional management actions needed to protect and/or restore damages to the habitat.
 - b. Surveys for fairy shrimp The City should conduct periodic surveys once every 5 years when there is sufficient rainfall to document the status of the San Diego fairy shrimp in each of the pools in Fairview Park.
- 10. Adaptive Management —Review the effectiveness of management actions annually to determine if additional measures are needed to protect San Diego fairy shrimp from harm. Cable wire fencing is proposed in the Fairview Park Master Plan to protect the pool basins. If this type of fencing is not adequate to prevent the public from regularly entering the basin areas, additional fencing or a different type of fencing may be required. If the degradation of the pools has already impacted the viability of the San Diego fairy shrimp, additional inoculation of the pools with cysts may be necessary.

Three additional vernal pool areas, located east of Placentia Avenue, require additional surveys to determine if San Diego fairy shrimp and/or sensitive vernal plant species are present. We recommend the City delineate the watershed of the three pools in the near future and avoid impacts to the watershed areas until protocol surveys (Service 1996) can be completed. Positive survey results may require changes in management actions to address

San Diego fairy shrimp. The City should coordinate adaptive management with the Service prior to implementation.

11. <u>Fairview Park Master Plan Update</u> – Include in an update to the Fairview Park Master Plan specific and ongoing management actions that will be implemented to ensure high quality habitat for San Diego fairy shrimp is maintained and that the species is protected.

These are the measures that are needed to protect San Diego fairy shrimp and their habitat in Fairview Park and are not intended to offset the damage caused by path construction. Issues relating to take that may have been caused by path construction remain under investigation by the Service at this time and will be addressed separately in the future.

Costa Mesa Mayor, City Council, City Staff, Fairview Park Steering Committee, and PACS Commissioners:

The Orange County Chapter of the California Native Plant Society (OCCNPS) has long had an interest in Fairview Park and the adjacent and connected lands of Talbert Regional Park, Canyon Park, and the recently conserved Randall Preserve. We are dedicated to the conservation of this remarkable place, its natural resources, its rare native plants, and the public's enjoyment and access to the land.

OCCNPS supports the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update. This plan presents clear, scientific findings that uphold the public's wishes for Fairview Park to prioritize habitat protection, restoration, and low-impact human use. Glider airplane flying and illegal trail from pedestrians and cyclists have significant negative impacts on habitats and native plant ecology and are incompatible and inappropriate activities at Fairview Park.

Fairview Park hosts several regionally rare and sensitive special-status native plant species which have been scientifically documented at Fairview Park, and other species that may be present and occurring nearby. Those documented at the park include the following (scientific documentation available upon request):

Callitriche longipedunculata, Longstock water-starwort

Locally Rare. One of only two Orange County locations

Camissoniopsis lewisii, Lewis's evening-primrose

As biologists and environmental scientists it is important for us to point out that much of the biological resources currently persisting at Fairview Park have already been severely compromised and significantly reduced. The current palette of plants occurring at Fairview Park is dominated and in many cases overwhelmed by invasive and non-native species. While green and at times even flowery, these species are not supporting ecological health or native biodiversity.

The fragile and sensitive lands at Fairview Park need not only protection, but restoration, to allow them to again provide essential biological and environmental services. Specifically, the disturbed soils and mounds need to be removed, the topography reformed to its original contour, the extensive invasive plants aggressively managed, locally native plant species restored, and off-trail travel restricted.

OCCNPS supports the recommendations made by the City's Master Planning expert consultants, the Fairview Park Steering Committee, the PACS commission, the resource agencies, and the requirements of State and Federal law to protect habitats and species. This plan will prohibit damage from high impact glider airplane and off-trail bicycle and foot-traffic activities and preserve the seven miles of trails for low-impact human recreation and natural resource health, as specified in the Master Plan Update.

Please accept the Fairview Park Master Plan Update and allocate proper funding to Fairview Park to increase illegal activity enforcement.

Dear City Council of the City of Costa Mesa:

We are writing to encourage the City of Costa Mesa to protect the valuable natural resources at Fairview Park ("Park") by modifying the Draft Master Plan Update to re-site the current model airplane fly field away Fairview Park. The City has an excellent opportunity to stop ongoing harms to sensitive species and habitats and set a foundation that protects and celebrates the unique and valuable natural resources present at Fairview Park.

The Center is a non-profit, public interest environmental organization dedicated to the protection of native species and their habitats through science, policy, and environmental law. The Center has over 1.7 million members and online activists throughout California and the United States. The Center has worked for many years to protect imperiled plants and wildlife, open space, air and water quality, and overall quality of life for people in Orange County.

Fairview Park supports incredible biodiversity, including numerous threatened and endangered species as well as highly imperiled habitats. The Biological Resources Technical Report ("Report") prepared for the Master Plan Update appropriately highlights these species, noting that the Park supports over 200 plants, several federally endangered birds and invertebrates, and several species that are currently candidates for protection under the California Endangered Species Act ("CESA"), among many other wildlife species. The abundance and diversity present in the Park are particularly notable for such an urban area.

Unfortunately, past use of the park has harmed valuable species and habitats. Invasive species, intentional malicious destruction of plants, and model airplane flying have all harmed vernal pools and the species that reside therein. In the case of model airplane flying, the Report provides a thorough accounting of the harms of this activity, including potential take of Crotch's bumble bee and burrowing owl (both CESA candidate species), trampling of vegetation including rare special-status plants, spread of invasive plants, and disturbance of both resident and migratory birds (including nesting birds).

The Draft Master Plan Update ("Plan") includes significant improvements in this regard but still allows for significant disruption to native species and habitats. We are very pleased to see that the Plan update moves the fly field away from the western side of the Park, removing the direct threat from this activity to the vernal pool watershed that has resulted in so much damage in the past. However, the east side of the park also hosts sensitive species and habitats. Burrowing owls have been observed overwintering in grasslands on both sides of Placentia Ave, and northern harriers, white-tailed kites, and other raptors use these habitats to forage. Seasonal pools on both the west and east sides of the Park also support federally endangered San Diego fairy shrimp. By moving the fly field to the east side of the Park, the Master Plan appropriately minimizes the impacts of this activity on vernal pools, but allows for the potential disruption and harm to special status birds, plants, and invertebrates on the east side of the Park. Special status species throughout the park should be protected, not just on the west side.

We fully support the Master Plan's removal of hobby flying from the vernal pool watershed on the west side of the Park; this is an excellent improvement from existing conditions. We encourage City Council to strengthen the City's commitment to its precious natural resources by protecting the east side of the park as well. Re-siting the fly field away from the Park entirely is the best way to remove the harmful impacts of this activity on any and all sensitive habitats and species present in the Park's boundaries. We hope City Council will celebrate the progress that has been made with the current Draft Master Plan Update and push for even better stewardship of the Park's wild spaces, ensuring that residents of Costa Mesa can enjoy this natural gem now and for years to come.

- 16. Develop and adopt the Maintenance, Operations, and Management Plan for Fairview Park, including the Invasive Plant Species Management Plan for Fairview Park.
- 17. Continue to build partnerships with organizations invested in environmental conservation, and expand opportunities to participate in community-based restoration, stewardship, and nature-based educational activities.
- 18. Provide continuing opportunities for tribal coordination and participation in the implementation of the Updated Fairview Park Master Plan.
- 19. Provide ADA-accessible pathway(s) from the main parking lot to the existing paved multipurpose path west of the main parking lot.
- 20. Provide an emergency and service vehicular access point into the park from Pacific Avenue. Develop protocol guidelines for vehicular use of this access point.
- 21. Provide for the incorporation of a central interpretive area.
- 22. Incorporate viewing platforms and scenic viewpoint features to enhance environmental interpretive opportunities while preserving sensitive features.
- 23. Incorporate nature play elements throughout the park and a nature play area within the existing lawn area.
- 24. Incorporate a native pollinator area to attract butterflies and other pollinators. The native pollinator area would replace the ornamental vegetation including invasive species currently located in the planter area.
- 25. Modify and refine the name of the Fairview Park site to a more nature-oriented name, such as "Fairview Nature Park" to reflect the site's exceptional natural resources, significant conservation value, and lasting legacy as Costa Mesa's premier natural open space asset.

I write as a longtime Costa Mesa resident who participated in the 1998 and 2008 Fairview Park Master Plan updates. Those efforts, in my view, struck an appropriate balance between environmental stewardship and public access—reflecting the city's character and the community's needs. I am concerned that the current update departs from that balanced approach, and will not be in compliance with the "Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions" as set forth when the park was deeded to the City (see page two of the "1986 FVP Grant Deed" attachment).

In recent years, discussions around Fairview Park have grown more polarized, and proposals circulating today appear to favor a significantly more exclusionary model—one that prioritizes additional fencing and restricted access over the park's historic role as an open, welcoming public space. Costa Mesa is not a "cookie-cutter" city; our identity is rooted in accessibility, inclusion, and practical stewardship. Converting Fairview Park into a de facto preserve without meaningful compromise would diminish its value for residents while failing to recognize how responsible, managed public use has coexisted with conservation for more than seven decades.

I appreciate the importance of protecting sensitive habitat and cultural resources. However, several claims advanced in support of widespread restrictions do not appear grounded in impartial, publicly vetted studies, and the proposed direction risks overcorrecting—shifting from stewardship to exclusion. As our city grows, residents need thoughtful access to nature close to home: trails that are well designed and maintained, recreation that is compatible with protection, and a management framework that is adaptive, evidence-based, and transparent.

I respectfully ask the Council to revise the proposed Master Plan update

to reaffirm a reasoned, balanced approach that sustains the current level of public access.

Specifically:

- Commit to evidence-based management: Direct Park staff to use impartial studies, clear metrics, and regular public reporting to guide decisions.
- **Prioritize compatible access:** Maintain... Concerts in the Park, Model Railroad, Waldorf School access, Pedestrian and Jogging Trails and the Model Glider Field in its current location.
- **Ensure inclusive process:** Engage a broad cross-section of resource agencies, residents, experts, and stakeholders so no single interest dominates outcomes.

Fairview Park has long embodied Costa Mesa's best qualities: accessibility, stewardship, and community. Let's preserve that legacy by choosing a balanced plan that protects the environment and keeps the park meaningfully open to the public.

My name is Tom Dennis, and I live at 948 Joann St., Costa Mesa, CA 92627. My parents purchased our home in 1963, and I eventually inherited it. I attended Canyon School, Wilson School, Rea School, and ultimately Estancia High School. My entire life has been connected to Fairview Park — or as we've always called it, "The Bluff."

In its current state, Fairview Park is, in my opinion, one of the best examples of urban planning I have ever seen. It strikes a perfect balance between natural space and functional community use. With that in mind, I want to express my deep concern about several of the proposed changes:

Elimination of Concerts in the Park

These events bring our entire city together every summer. They are safe, peaceful, and genuinely community-building.

Elimination of the Glider Field

I have watched model glider enthusiasts fly there my entire life. They harm no one and have been part of the park's identity for decades.

Removal of the Kids' Bike Mounds

This proposal makes no sense. Kids have been riding bikes at Fairview Park since long before these small mounds were created — we had famous jumps like The Drop, Double Jump, and King Hill. The current mounds are modest by comparison, but they keep kids outside, active, and engaged.

Possible Elimination of the Model Trains

The trains are one of the most beloved and distinctive features of the park. They help make Costa Mesa a great place to live and raise a family.

With all these proposed removals, I can't help but wonder: what is the end goal? I do not believe it is about preserving nature — the park is healthy as it is. Increasingly, everything seems to come with a fee, a membership, or a paywall. Is that where this is heading? Paid admission to concerts? To the park itself? Other cities have gone that route — but Costa Mesa shouldn't.

I am resubmitting my feedback ahead of the November 18th City Council meeting and respectfully ask that this message be entered into the public record in lieu of my attendance.

First, thank you for the extensive work that has gone into the **Fairview Park Master Plan Update** (**Draft 2025**). It's clear that significant time and care have been invested in protecting the park's ecological and cultural resources.

At the same time, after reviewing the draft and listening to the discussion at the last public meeting, it seems clear that **many residents share concern that Fairview Park is being treated more as a preserve than a public park**. The draft language, with its emphasis on fencing, restricted access, and restoration-only priorities, risks altering the very spirit that makes Fairview meaningful to Costa Mesa — a place where people and nature connect.

Fairview Park should remain **a public park**, not a preserve. The goal should be balance: protecting habitat *while also* welcoming people to experience, learn, and build memories there.

Measure AA and the Need for a True Community Vision

The current plan's scope — including large-scale grading, elevated walkways, new drainage systems, and permanent interpretive structures — appears to constitute **major physical change and new uses** that likely trigger **Measure AA**.

Before proceeding, I respectfully request a **formal legal determination** confirming whether these proposed actions meet that threshold.

If Measure AA applies, then Costa Mesa has a once-in-a-generation opportunity — not just to vote on compliance, but to **craft a new, community-driven vision** for Fairview Park: one that's built *with* residents, not merely *for* them.

A Park That Reflects Its People

All over the world, there are extraordinary examples of parks where **nature and humanity coexist beautifully**:

• The High Line (New York): where native grasses and art transform an industrial relic

- into an urban oasis.




The New HSS Runway Has Arrived!

The Slope Is Dead...Long Live The Slope!

The inevitable bulldozers have arrived at the Backbay and so other premier S. Cal slope site falls to "progress". The Backbay was the HSS site when the wind was "blowing south" and could those tropical stormfront winds blow! Days of fibresleds loaded to the servo clearances with lead... pumping, rolling, split-S-ing in formation all the while one looks out over the beautiful Newport Harbor are now but a memory. While HSS retains the Estancia site with it's great accessibility and landing areas, we have lost our "southwind site". Between the 2 locations we had 70% of the prevailing wind covered, although often with some frustration when the wind split the difference at about 205 degrees!

So what do we do about it? Place our Airticks, Tornadoes, Piranhas, and other assorted lawndarts on a shelf immersed in a block of epoxy to be gawked at by our children's children as an ancient lost art of the good old days? Reading QFI and other mags it's clear nationally slope is as strong today as ever owing to the variety of activities (combat, PSS, racing, scale, thermal, etc.) it can support and beginners it attracts. Alternative HSS sites are needed.


So what makes a great alternative site...let's see...southwinds...beautiful view... a better orientation to those 205 degree wind splits.... With this in mind Lynn "Piranha Rudolf" Johansen and I set off to check out a rumored Crystal Cove site. Now some will say this is pretty low adventure having "been there done that" years ago, but with both of us living almost directly between Estancia and Backbay - neither one of us had ever needed to venture out!

So with some surprise we discovered a great site! Crystal Cove/Reef Point is a "bowl with a point" giving lift on two sides from southwest to south blowing winds. If anything it compliments Estancia better than Backbay ever did because the 205 degree winds are not a problem! Overlooking a quiet beach (Read: no water landings) one fellow soarer had his wife and kids camped at the bottom and climbed the steps (Read: no dangerous pathways) up to the top occasionally to fly. And for the "soarhounds", the local flyers report "summertime views" almost as nice as at the base of Torry Pines State Beach!

OK enough hype, what's not so good with the site? Landings and a \$6 State Park single entrance fee. While there is plenty of room to land, it is covered with "protected coastal plantlife". So build those leading edges strong! Entrance fees are charged til about 3pm so come late if you wish to just sample the action. An annual pass (\$75 for first vehicle, \$20 for second... it sounds like \$45 for two!) is the "way to go". The Local Flyers are friendly, perhaps having been protected from our typical Estancia crowds by the entrance fee.

Getting there is fairly easy <u>after</u> you get through Corona Del Mar. Those coming in on the 55/73 freeways have an advantage of hooking around the whole CDM mess via Newport Coast Drive. Go south on PCH 1.5 miles past Newport Coast Drive then turn towards the ocean at the sign that says "Crystal Cove State Park Reef Point Entrance". In the parking lot turn right if the wind is from the west and left if it is from the south. It's cool, check it out.

The draft 2025 Fairview Park Master Plan should correct the history of HSS in the park to indicate their presence is not documented until 1974 and that prior to that HSS's dominant flying area was overlooking Newport Harbor/Back Bay. The HSS history should also note that the club's existence has always been a struggle for existence. HSS was formed after a chance meeting of two men while flying near Newport Harbor and Newport Back Bay in the early 1960s. A founding member of the club states the flying site at the harbor was instrumental in the formation of the Club. The HSS AMA charter is from 1962, but that is not when HSS activities first occurred in Fairview Park. The original home of their club was Newport Harbor (thus the name Harbor Soaring Society). Fairview Park only became the prime HSS location in the early 1970s after gradually losing their soaring and flying sites in Newport Beach and Irvine. You can hear that history on YouTube from the founding president.

December 1974 is the first date of an aerial photograph showing evidence of club scale flying activities on the Fairview bluff. The evidenced in the 1974 aerial photograph is bluff top damage from flying, namely trampled vegetation, compacted soils, and increased erosion. Early aerial photographs of the same area from 1968, 1970, and 1972 do not show these ground disturbances and indicate that flying off the bluff could not have been of significance in those years.

In its January 1975 newsletter, HSS refers to the bluff site as the Estancia site and other times as the Estancia High School field. Prior to 1974, individuals may have flown the bluff and later become HSS members as the club grew. There are no HSS newsletters archived pre-1975. The February 1975 newsletter mentions the club is worried about losing the Estancia High School site due to use of the school's baseball fields (for baseball games) and suggests using the rougher bluff area west of the elementary school (now Waldorf). This suggested that in early 1975 there was not yet a club consensus as to the precise flying site along the mesa with activities occurring at the high school and the bluff.

In a 1995 aerial photograph HSS activities include glider launches using several winch lines set back from the bluff at a time or significant disturbance in the park from dumping of construction debris in the large vernal pool. The winch launch can be seen in the 1995 aerial photograph as linear vegetation loss along several straight lines fanning out toward the bluff and through the large vernal pool. This winch area was abandoned by HSS due to the 1996 restoration of the large vernal pool to protect its population of endangered San Diego Fairy Shrimp. The January 1996 HSS newsletter article "the slope is dead . . . long live the slope!" (attached), HSS struggles with the possible loss of its original Back Bay flying site and considers where it would move to. HSS considers adding Corona Del Mar and in 1991 documents other fly fields it is using with a map (attached)

The apparent end of glider bluff slope flying was exacerbated in 2000, when Talbert Park trees planted at the bluff base degraded thermal uplifts making the bluffs unfavorable to glider flying. Radio control airplane flying in the park increased due to the 1999 closure of the nearby fly field at Mile Square Park to make way for new golf course holes and softball fields. The club began to report more on RC planes in their 2000 and 2001 newsletters and worried again about the club's future and noise complaints from powered motor plants. A graded earth fly field in Fairview Park was petitioned and first created in Fairview Park in 2005 and then enlarged in 2009.

Gliders and RC planes coexisted in Fairview Park with the development of the landing strip.

In 2017, the City of Costa Mesa (City) formed the Fairview Park Steering Committee with the purpose of updating the park's masterplan. The committee consider the parks highest use to be a nature park and found the HSS activities to be incompatible with wildlife and endangered species preservation in the park. While negotiations between the City, the committee and HSS occurred, flying continued and HSS researched potential relocation sites. Due to the COVID 19 pandemic, in March of 2020 the City closed Fairview Park to all uses. In 2023, glider flying was again allowed by the City but motorized airplanes were expressly prohibited. In 2025, the Steering Committee and Parks and Community Service Commission continue to agree with State and Federal resource agencies that HSS should be relocated from the park.

Dear Costa Mesa Mayor, City Council, City Staff, Fairview Park Steering Committee, and PACS Commissioners,

I support the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update and potential subsequent allocation of funding to increase enforcement against illegal activity occurring in the park.

I grew up in Huntington Beach in the 80s, where my family would drive to Fairview Park as its unique location invites anyone who is geographically connected via Santa Ana River Trail and its surroundings. The park is unparalleled in its beauty and ecological importance, inspiring me to contribute to its recent habitat restoration initiative even after several decades.

Activities such as the HSS field have some value for hobbyists. However, agency recommendations and findings confirm that these areas overlapping with habitat are rare, fragile, and irreplaceable. Once a natural area is lost, it is impossible to rebuild and replicate. Our best step is conservation and protecting what remains so that future generations — human and non-human — can continue to benefit from it, as stated in the City's Open Space Master Plan.

Similarly, I'd also like to acknowledge that the informal bike mounds and off-trail unsanctioned pathways constructed by unauthorized enthusiasts were never part of the park's intended or approved use. Allowing these practices would be promoting illegal activity and violate the protections that Fairview Park is obligated to uphold.

It's my sincere hope as a professional to find solutions where people continue to enjoy their recreational traditions, while also honoring our legal responsibilities to the park environment. An old, established practice does not mean it was a correct practice. Social change can be hard for people to adapt to, but human-induced change is even harder on the natural world which has been in balance for millennia – one in which organisms have no way of adapting quickly to human disturbances.

I support the recommendations by the City's Master Planning expert consultants, Fairview Park Steering Committee, PACS commission, resource agencies, state and federal law, to protect habitat by ceasing model aircraft and off-trail activities, while preserving the 7 miles of trails for low-impact recreation outlined in the Master Plan Update.

I support the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update and potential subsequent allocation of funding to increase enforcement against illegal activity occurring in the park.

I grew up in Huntington Beach in the 80s, where my family would drive to Fairview Park as its unique location invites anyone who is geographically connected via Santa Ana River Trail and its surroundings. The park is unparalleled in its beauty and ecological importance, inspiring me to contribute to its recent habitat restoration initiative even after several decades.

Activities such as the HSS field have some value for hobbyists. However, agency recommendations and findings confirm that these areas overlapping with habitat are rare, fragile, and irreplaceable. Once a natural area is lost, it is impossible to rebuild and replicate. Our best step is conservation and protecting what remains so that future generations — human and non-human — can continue to benefit from it, as stated in the City's Open Space Master Plan.

Similarly, I'd also like to acknowledge that the informal bike mounds and off-trail unsanctioned pathways constructed by unauthorized enthusiasts were never part of the park's intended or approved use. Allowing these practices would be promoting illegal activity and violate the protections that Fairview Park is obligated to uphold.

It's my sincere hope as a professional to find solutions where people continue to enjoy their recreational traditions, while also honoring our legal responsibilities to the park environment. An old, established practice does not mean it was a correct practice. Social change can be hard for people to adapt to, but human-induced change is even harder on the natural world which has been in balance for millennia – one in which organisms have no way of adapting quickly to human disturbances.

I support the recommendations by the City's Master Planning expert consultants, Fairview Park Steering Committee, PACS commission, resource agencies, state and federal law, to protect habitat by ceasing model aircraft and off-trail activities, while preserving the 7 miles of trails for low-impact recreation outlined in the Master Plan Update.

City Council,

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) states in a letter to the City of Costa Mesa: "The regional biological significance of Fairview Park cannot be overstated. The Park is the northernmost parcel of a rare, contiguous undeveloped natural open space, which stretches from Fairview Park southward through Talbert Regional Park and terminates at the Randall Preserve. The 208-acre, topographically diverse Park contains a multitude of habitat types and micro-habitats, including one of the last coastal terrace vernal pools complexes in Orange County on its mesa."

Many of the hundreds of plant and animal species are endemic to the Park, some species use it as a migration waystation and others overwinter here many of which are threatened, endangered, protected, or have been listed as such.

"CDFW has a long history of engaging with the City on natural resources matters at Fairview Park, most notably vernal pool complex management issues, historic violations...ongoing impacts to areas subject to Fish and Game Code...and outstanding mitigation obligations...that continue to languish."

City violations include:

- Damage to vernal pools, then incomplete restoration of pools 2, 5, 6, and 7.
- Not securing a Lake and Streambed Alteration Agreement before taking soil from pond creation and dumping it into Little Canyon for trails; and clearing vegetation in and around the artificial pond complex during the nesting season for coastal California gnatcatcher.
- And finally, the City has taken no action on its mitigation obligations with various agencies.

"Finally, there is scientific evidence to support that the fly field activities lead to harassment of sensitive avian species, including raptors. Birds that rely on Fairview Park for food and shelter could temporarily abandon these habitats during fly field use, leading to a loss of critical resources during key

times, such as during migration or overwintering periods. For fly field activities that occur at the beginning of nesting season, birds may choose not to nest in the area at all." Various studies cited that constant stress, anxiety, and elevated heart and metabolic rate lowers birds immunity, eventually killing them.

"CDFW strongly supports relocation of the model airplane fly field, as its continued operation in the vernal pool complex is in direct conflict with preservation and management of this important park feature. The goals of the Master Plan Update cannot be achieved while private citizens continue to take it upon themselves to grade and mow these sensitive habitats to maintain fly field runways on City property."

If the fly field remains, CDFW would require a CESA Incidental Take Permit for the western burrowing owl and Crotch's bumble bee costing \$50 to \$100,000. And due to past violations, annual mitigation and monitoring by a permitted biologist would be required costing \$10,000. And this is just the state agencies.

"It can only be assumed that, despite our efforts to negotiate in good faith with the City regarding wetland permitting obligations, seven years' worth of unauthorized impacts are likely...subject to Fish and Game Code Section 1602...Park enforcement is necessary to ensure the City complies with Fish and Game Code, as well as conditions as described in any forthcoming CDFW-issued permit....A Master Plan Update would not be complete without addressing the outstanding Routine Maintenance agreement notification and any other one-time projects in the Park; this includes how they will be completed, funded, when, and by whom." I wholeheartedly agree.

Harbor Soaring Society

The most frequently prescribed treatments for impotence :

Vacuum Therapy



This is the least invasive of all the treatments, it also offers the highest rate of success, about 90%. Patients rate it high for convenience and satisfaction, and because it provides the ability to initiate and end the erection when desired. The technique works by applying negative pressure to the penis by placing a cylinder over it and withdrawing the air. Under pressure, blood then flows rapidly into the penis creating an erection. A tension ring is then placed on the base of the erect penis to maintain rigidity and can be left in place for up to 30 minutes.

Self-injection Therapy



This treatment option the patient gives himself an injection directly into the base of the penis. The needle is small, similar to the one used of insulin injections by diabetics, and the erections are usually of good quality and will last about an hour. The drawbacks are mostly logistic. Some men are reluctant to give themselves shots. Can be used 2-3 times a week and only once every 24 hours. Over time injections can cause scarring which could lead to permanent damage in the penis.

Personal embarrassment and lack of knowledge frequently prevent individuals from seeking medical help. And even though 85% of impotence is a result of physical

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service did not have a chance to complete our review of the Fairview Park Master Plan due to a lack of staff resources during the government shutdown (October 1 - November 12). We have been working closely with the City of Costa Mesa since at least 2012 to minimize impacts to sensitive resources in the park and we appreciate that many of our past recommendations have been implemented or incorporated as part of the plan (e.g., installing educational signs, boardwalk between vernal pools 1 and 4, and protective fencing, eliminating user-defined trails). We support comments/recommendations provided by California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) but would appreciate an opportunity to discuss these comments with the City, as they pertain to species protected under the Federal Endangered Species Act, prior to

finalization of the Master Plan. It is encouraging to see that the City has considered the ongoing documented impacts to biological resources associated with the existing glider area and is proposing to relocate the area away from vernal pools occupied by several federally listed species. In addition to CDFW comments, we recommend the following revisions/additions to the Master Plan, based on our limited review:

- 1. The plan identifies federally listed species on page 27 in the section titled "Federal Endangered Species Act (ESA)". Please add the least Bell's vireo and coastal California gnatcatcher (both known to occur in Fairview Park) to this section.
- 2. Development and implementation of a fence plan to minimize unauthorized entry into vernal pools should be a top implementation priority. The Master Plan identifies the need for protective fencing in several sections, but we recommend the potential types and locations of fences (fence plan) are included, consistent with the level of detail provided for the trail plan. The lack of appropriate fencing has contributed to unauthorized impacts and degradation of vernal pools in Fairview Park for decades and we are concerned that the lack of specificity in the Master Plan will result in this task continuing to languish, even as the trail system is developed.
- 3. We appreciate the change in the location of the proposed children's play area ("Nature Play Area"), to the Lawn Area. We recommend that native shrubs (e.g., lemonade berry, toyon or other large, dense shrubs) are used for visual/noise screening between the play area and adjacent recently restored and/or proposed native plant restoration areas to minimize disturbance to wildlife.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide comments on the Master Plan and anticipate continued coordination with the City regarding measures to avoid and minimize impacts to federally listed species as specific plans are further developed. Please feel free to contact me if you have questions regarding these comments.

Dear Mayor and Councilmembers,

I am writing with concern about the current version of the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan.

Costa Mesa has the unique privilege of being home to the oldest active RC model glider club in the nation – the Harbor Soaring Society (HSS). While in the 1960s HSS flew at many locations, over time Fairview Park became its home. Fairview Park is still very reasonable for soaring and I find it unconscionable that some in the community would recommend removing this important historical use. Allow me to explain why.

I hold a B.A. in biology from UC Santa Cruz and a Ph.D. in biology from UCLA. As a professional biologist I have also had the good fortune of having a hobby in model aviation for more than 50 years and have flown RC gliders at locations all around the world. In my travels I have had the pleasure of soaring on multiple occasions at Fairview Park with HSS, it is a super field.

By their nature RC gliders are silent and pilots seek lift in the atmosphere to continue their flights. These enthusiasts share a mantra of working with nature rather than against nature. The RC gliding community doesn't power its way through the air with noisy propellers or jets. We extract potential energy from the atmosphere and use that to continue our silent soaring flights. This aspect of aeromodelling is entirely compatible with natural resources such as parks. For instance, RC gliders have been flown at the Torrey Pines Gliderport in San Diego for many decades, an area which is partly owned and operated by the City of San Diego as Torrey Pines City Park – preserving the natural cliffs for soaring flight and as natural open space. Throughout the US there are many similar shared use examples involving RC gliders. I have enjoyed sharing the air with birds of many types, mainly birds of prey, and they do not mind. In fact, they often soar alongside my models with curiosity. We circle together in lift - we share the atmospheric resource. I do not provoke them with my RC glider, they do not fear the unpowered

model glider.

I suspect those expressing opposition to model aviation must not have experienced the same things or may have witnessed powered drones or other powered models flying around at the park with their motor on the entire time. I wholly agree that Fairview Park is not an appropriate place for powered drones or quadcopters. However, RC soaring is very different than these noisy aircraft and is synergistic with the open space goals. Most importantly - having a club such as the Harbor Soaring Society present at the location as good stewards helps to preclude others who would fly powered RC in egregious ways that the community seeks to avoid. Retaining them as our eyes and ears for safety and appropriate operation improves overall community welfare.

Additionally, we are in a time when it is critical for youth to have hands-on experiences with STEM technology towards careers in science and engineering. With urban growth it is increasingly difficult to find locations like Fairview Park for model aircraft training. The draft plan suggests moving the HSS operations to a different location in the park closer to the train area. This is detrimental, places two incongruent uses in proximity and decreases safety. The current (historic) location is perfectly suitable and most appropriate. Please allow HSS to continue this important mission and help use Fairview Park for RC soaring in a safe and congruent way with the natural resource. This is most easily accomplished by simply retaining the existing 2008 Fairview Master Plan. This is not just a Costa Mesa issue, model glider pilots in the region, state, and nation are concerned with the draft plan and the future of HSS.

My name is Josh Johnson, I've been a Costa Mesa resident most of my life since 1977. Public Comment Letter - Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update

November 18, 2025

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

For 61 years, the Fairview Park Flying Field has operated in the same location with the full knowledge of regulatory agencies, the City, and generations of Costa Mesa residents. Across six decades of environmental studies—including the 1995 Brandman Report, 2014 USFWS Letter, 2016–2018 Endemic biological reports, 2019–2021 City of Costa Mesa Compatibility Study, and 2019–2025 agency correspondence—not a single documented biological impact has ever been attributed to the flying field or its maintenance.

Despite this, the Draft Master Plan Update is based on technical errors, incorrect assumptions, and incomplete or misleading agency engagement, ultimately promoting an extreme "nature preserve only" vision that contradicts the community's expectations and the voter intent of Measure AA.

Key Findings:

- 1. Regulatory agencies do NOT recommend closing or relocating the flying field.
 - The 2014 USFWS letter identified all potential vernal pool impacts and did not identify the flying field as a concern.
 - USFWS (2014–2025) consistently recommended simple mitigation measures, not removal.
 - The 2025 CDFW letter was solicited under incomplete information and is not a directive to relocate the field.
- 2. LandIQ's technical report is deeply flawed.
 - No topographic study was performed.
 - The "vernal pool watershed" map is unsupported by hydrology or slope analysis.
 - Substantial factual inaccuracies undermine the credibility of the report's conclusions.
- 3. The Draft Plan adopts the most restrictive, least balanced interpretation possible.

- It proposes removing decades-long community amenities with little evidentiary basis:
 - Flying field
 - Bike mounds
 - Small trails
 - Open play areas
 - (Eventually) model trains
- Fencing is mentioned 22 times and would permanently close much of the mesa to people.
- 4. The flying field is already in the least-impactful, safest possible location.
 - We can avoid impacts by embracing environmental best practices like performing biological surveys.
- 5. The Draft Plan contradicts the voter intent of Measure AA.
 - Measure AA defines the Master Plan as the 2008 plan, and prohibits significant changes without a vote.
 - The Draft Plan removes activities—not adds them—exploiting a loophole that violates the spirit of Measure AA.

Request to Council:

- 1. Reject or suspend adoption of the Draft Master Plan Update.

 The technical foundation is flawed, the process has been biased, and the resulting recommendations are not defensible.
- 2. Direct staff to correct technical reports and reengage agencies collaboratively with HSS included.

HSS has been excluded from key meetings despite being the only on-site subject matter experts.

- 3. Preserve the Fairview Park Flying Field in its historical location.

 This location minimizes environmental disturbance and maximizes community benefit.
- 4. Initiate proceedings to designate the Fairview Park Flying Field as a Local Historic Landmark.

Mayor, Mayor Pro Tem, and Councilmembers,

On behalf of the Harbor Soaring Society (HSS), we respectfully submit this letter regarding the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan Update. After reviewing the plan, the associated technical reports, biological documentation dating back three decades, and the full regulatory history, HSS strongly urges the City Council to reject or suspend the Draft Master Plan Update until several foundational issues can be corrected.

1. The Regulatory Record Does Not Support Relocating or Closing the Flying Field

USFWS (2014–2025): Consistent, balanced recommendations

The 2014 USFWS Letter—the only formal guidance ever issued regarding all vernal pools in Fairview Park—identified every potential impact to vernal pools throughout the park. It did not identify the flying field or its maintenance as a threat. Instead, it recommended:

- Avoiding wet soils
- Training and education
- Noise minimization
- Enforcement of a permit system
- Well-defined boundaries of activity

Those are the same recommendations USFWS repeated in 2019.

The agency repeatedly expressed that the flying field was a manageable use.

CDFW (2025): The letter was solicited under incomplete information

The September 2025 CDFW letter was not input to the Master Plan process. It was a response to staff questions, including issues unrelated to the flying field (e.g., restoration grant obligations).

HSS was excluded from all CDFW meetings.

HSS never received notice of any alleged disturbance events referenced in staff emails—contradicting 61 years of zero documented impacts.

The 2023 precedent

A very similar situation occurred in 2023, when staff solicited a CDFW email supporting field closure after USFWS twice declined to recommend it. Subsequent public records requests showed that:

- Staff did not provide USFWS or CDFW with complete or accurate information.
- The "shutdown" recommendation was created due to staff solicitation—not regulatory conclusion.

This pattern matters.

2. The LandIQ Technical Report Contains Serious Technical Errors

The March 22, 2024 LandIQ report—upon which much of the Draft Master Plan relies—contains multiple foundational problems:

No topographic study

Despite defining "vernal pool watersheds," no slope analysis, hydrological modeling, or elevation data was performed.

Watershed boundaries are unsupported

The drawn watershed polygons do not match:

- The LandIQ 2024 mapping
- The 2014 USFWS map
- The 1995 Brandman Report
- On-the-ground topography
- Photographic evidence from the wet season

These errors contaminate the entire biological impact narrative.

Fundamental factual inaccuracies

Examples include:

- Misidentifying the flying field as created "circa 2015" rather than circa 1964.
- Claiming mowing is a major threat despite not knowing how many times HSS mowed in 2023–2024.

 Stating that flying patterns overlap sensitive habitat—contradicted by 2019–2021 field observations and agency letters.

Biological monitoring was not included

LandIQ relied almost exclusively on:

- Staff reports
- Conflicting anecdotal statements
- Prior consultant narratives

The omission of actual data is unacceptable for a document intended to guide park management for decades.

3. The Draft Master Plan Takes the Most Restrictive, Least Balanced Interpretation Possible
The Draft Plan removes or severely restricts:

- The flying field
- Bike mounds
- Small trails
- Bike trails
- Dog walking
- Open play areas

This is not balance.

This is redefining the park as a fenced nature preserve, contrary to its history, the 2008 Fairview Park Master Plan, and the voter-intent of Measure AA.

Fencing is referenced 22 times in the technical report, and the plan proposes restricting nearly all human access to the outer perimeter of the mesa.

- 4. The Current Flying Field Location Is Environmentally Superior to the Proposed Relocation Site
 - The current west-side location is the least impactful zone in the entire park.

- The east side is worse for:
 - wildlife,
 - wind flow,
 - slope dynamics,
 - public safety,
 - flight operations.

Relocation would cost hundreds of thousands of dollars, require a vote of the people, require extensive CEQA review, and likely fail operationally—an irresponsible use of public funds.

5. Measure AA Requires Fidelity to the 2008 Master Plan and a Community-Centered Approach

Measure AA legally defines the Fairview Park Master Plan as the 2008 Revision.

The Draft Master Plan Update:

- Rewrites this central document
- Removes long-established uses
- Expands restoration beyond what is required
- Exploits a loophole allowing removal without a vote
- Conflicts with decades of public access and community expectation

This contradicts the spirit and intent of Measure AA.

REQUESTS TO CITY COUNCIL

1. Reject or suspend adoption of the current Draft Master Plan Update.

The technical foundation is unsound, and the process has failed to reflect community input.

2. Direct staff to correct inaccuracies in the technical reports.

Require topography, updated biological surveys, and accurate historical data.

3. Direct staff to collaboratively reengage USFWS and CDFW with HSS included.

HSS must be in the room—no more unilateral staff-only agency meetings.

- 4. Explicitly preserve the flying field in its historical, environmentally optimal location.
- 5. Initiate proceedings to designate the Fairview Park Flying Field as a Local Historic Landmark, recognizing its 61-year contribution to education, STEM, community culture, and passive recreation.

CONCLUSION

Fairview Park has always been a shared space.

The flying field, the small trails, the trains, the mounds, the concerts, and the open spaces have coexisted with wildlife for more than six decades—not by accident, but because Fairview Park is large enough to support both people and nature.

The Draft Master Plan Update does not reflect that balance.

HSS respectfully asks the City Council to protect the community's longstanding relationship with Fairview Park by rejecting the Draft Master Plan Update and preserving the flying field and other irreplaceable amenities.



I am writing to express my opposition to the current Draft Fairview Park Master Plan and to request significant revisions so that longstanding, community-supported uses can continue at Fairview Park.

For decades, the Harbor Soaring Society has operated responsibly at Fairview Park—under permits, under supervision, and with biological surveys conducted before any maintenance. City staff have publicly acknowledged that HSS has "by and large followed the rules" we've been asked to follow. The flying field has existed since 1964 and has peacefully coexisted with sensitive wildlife for six decades.

Yet the Draft Master Plan proposes shifting the flying field to the east side of the park—directly into the same vernal pool watershed and burrowing owl habitat used by the Goat Hill Junction model trains, a heavily trafficked attraction with permanent infrastructure, year-round vegetation clearance, and regular operation. And here lies the fundamental contradiction: the City and CDFW assert that model aircraft *could* disturb birds, alter behavior, interfere with migration cues, or conflict with sensitive habitat. But every one of those theoretical impacts exists in the very location to which the City now proposes to relocate the glider field.

The model trains operate with locomotives, whistles, crowds, vibration, and tracks carved directly into the mesa. They require continuous vegetation clearance and sit squarely within the same ecological areas that staff now describe as "too sensitive" for quiet, non-motorized gliders. If the potential impacts of gliders are disqualifying, then by that exact same logic, how can the railroad—or concerts, or off-leash dogs, or informal bike and walking trails—remain untouched? You cannot claim that gliders are uniquely disruptive while ignoring louder, more continuous, and more intrusive uses operating right next door. Either the habitat is too sensitive for *all* such uses, or the current reasoning is not credible.

In addition, many of these issues can be **avoided**, not eliminated by banning the activity. Requiring experienced pilot oversight, maintaining a well-managed flying rules, and setting clear boundaries would significantly reduce impacts from downed planes, grading, or habitat disturbance. A carefully regulated field could address most of what CDFW lists.

For these reasons, the Master Plan should explicitly preserve the model glider field in its current location, along with other longstanding community activities: Concerts in the Park, bicycle and dog-walking trail access, the dirt mounds, and the Goat Hill Junction Railroad. The

Plan should direct staff to work collaboratively with resource agencies to develop an approach that protects sensitive species while maintaining these community uses safely and compliantly.

I also do not support any new fencing that would restrict public access. Any revision should honor the community intent of Measure AA and preserve the park's open, shared character.

If the Draft Master Plan cannot be revised to reflect the community's established uses and expectations, then the City Council should consider canceling the Master Plan Update and retaining the existing 2008 Fairview Park Master Plan.

I would like to see studies and data demonstrating the actual impacts of glider use at its current location under the conditions that have been in place for more than a year. The Harbor Soaring Society has implemented all recommendations from the City and regulatory agencies to minimize impacts to sensitive wildlife, including eliminating motored aircraft, reducing flying days and times, and closely coordinating with City representatives when gliders need to be recovered, among other measures.

The gliding activities should be evaluated based on these current conditions in their current location and analyzed for potential conflicts with wildlife and habitat—while also considering additional mitigation measures that could further reduce any such conflicts. Relocating to the east side of Placentia Avenue would be detrimental to glider operations due to different wind conditions and other factors, and would also require evaluation and mitigation measures to reduce/avoid impacts to sensitive resources. It would be fiscally irresponsible to spend hundreds of thousands of City dollars on new infrastructure in a location unsuitable for glider activity, particularly when there are only perceived impacts at the current site and activity level.

I am writing regarding my concerns with Fairview Park Master Plan Update DRAFT.

This updated draft plan removes huge amounts of vital recreation open space from the community. Trails are labeled as unauthorized; bike mounds and the fly field are to be removed and relocated, and fences will be constructed to keep residents out. I imagine that the Concerts in the Park and the Trains would also be forced to shut down if this horrendous draft plan for Fairview Park is adopted. The legal ability to relocate the flying field and bike mounds are also questionable, leaving me to believe that the DRAFT plan is designed specifically to eliminate most access to a vast area of the park, under the guise of restoration.

It appears that the justification for the drastic changes to the Park as based on a biased from a letter from The California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW). That letter references several studies which supposedly support their "ban all use" approach to Fairview Park. For example, the letter references a journal article from 2003 by Schummer and Eddleman: Effects of Disturbance on Activity and Energy Budgets of Migrating Waterbirds in South-Central Oklahoma.

The CDFW letter states "The presence of even lower-decibel noise and physical disturbances from fly field can interfere with these cues, potentially delaying or disrupting migration. This disruption could affect the birds' ability to arrive at their destination on time, impacting their survival and reproductive success (Schummer and Eddleman 2003).

The CDFW letter does not mention that the Schummer and Eddleman article was based on a National Wildlife Refuge that has 16,464 acres. They recorded 240 disturbances in 477.5 hours of observation throughout the 16,464 acres. They found that different species of birds were disturbed (or not) by different activities. The letter from the CDFW fails to mention Schummer and Eddleman's conclusion, which is to consider the habits of the birds when scheduling seasonal recreation dates.

"Rates of disturbance differed between species and appeared to be correlated to foraging strategies, habitat requirements, and type of disturbance. Therefore, managers of public lands should consider habits and migration chronologies of waterbirds when setting seasonal recreation dates. Modifying recreation policy could reduce rates of disturbance to some waterbirds."

If the CDFW's concern about "the presence of even lower-decibel noise and physical disturbances from fly field" is genuinely cause for removal of the Fly Field and all recreational activities in that section of the park, then why have they not recommended the removal of the Waldorf School, which is only 300 feet from the Fly Field, or the Jim Scott Stadium at Estancia High School at 600 feet away? Surely the cheering from a football game, or baseball game (only another 50 feet further) would also be disruptive.

Someone stands to make a lot of money if this draft plan is approved, and a contract is awarded. The residents of Costa Mesa and surrounding communities stand to lose a lot as well. Who is benefiting from this while we all lose recreation space, the flying field, bike trails and the mounds, Concerts in the Park and eventually the trains?

Please DO NOT APPROVE THE DRAFT PLAN!

For the past six months, I've been bringing my son, who is diagnosed with Autism and ADHD, to the flying field almost every weekend that it is open. What started as a simple father and son outing has turned into something truly special. He has fallen in love with flying and with the science behind how things soar. The members of the Harbor Soaring Society have gone above and beyond to welcome him, teaching him patience, problem solving, and a love of STEM.

This field has become more than a hobby spot. It's an outdoor classroom that has completely changed my son's relationship with learning. Science and math, which used to be his hardest subjects, are now his favorites. He spends hours building, experimenting, and asking thoughtful questions about aerodynamics and flight. The environment at the field is quiet, safe, and supportive, and it represents the best of what community learning can be.

I've read the report and the references to "Resource Agency recommendations" about noise, but those concerns are greatly overstated. These are model gliders, not gas powered planes. They are quieter than a kite on a breezy day.

Dear Councilmembers,

I am writing to express my strong support for the Fairview Park Master Plan Update (MPU). Below are my key points regarding the MPU:

- Conservation and Protection: State and federal agencies have made it clear: the current situation with Harbor Soaring Society cannot continue. The City must relocate the fly field away from the vernal pool complex or face fines and long-term oversight by regulatory agencies. There is already a conservation easement on the wetlands—similar protections should be extended to the rest of the park.
- 2. <u>Fiscal Responsibility</u>: **Keeping the fly field in the park is cost prohibitive**. Relocating it—even to the Eastside—would require undetermined construction costs, a **\$50K-\$100K** take permit, and **\$10K annually** for a biologist's report. This is not practical when other suitable locations exist, such as established recreation parks.
- 3. Fair Cost Sharing: HSS currently pays nothing for its use of the park, ranger staffing, or other City-incurred costs. The City must require HSS to cover these expenses, including the take permit and annual biologist report, if required. If not, then every resident should expect similar perks. I would like a free reserved tennis court and a playing field for me and my friends.
- 4. Relocating Fly Field: Moving glider activity to another part of the park will not solve the problem. The Eastside has wildlife concerns, including burrowing owl and Crotch's bumble bee. The launching winch will still damage the habitat (see photos of existing launch area and retrieval zone). Grading is prohibited on the archeological site. Errant gliders could land on Placentia Avenue, creating safety hazards. A better location would be Balearic Park, where westward launches could occur safely. Note: No other city in Orange County allows gliders/planes to fly in its public parks, with the exception of Laguna Niguel, which has one park in a gated community for gliders who have passed a test for a permit.

- 5. Enforcement and Staffing: Lack of enforcement is the largest source of problems in the park. Fencing will help, but compliance has been inconsistent. Provide funding for enforcement and safety: assign a full-time park ranger and install cameras in high-risk areas. Any lighting changes must meet Dark Sky standards and avoid harming wildlife.
- 6. <u>Bike Trails</u>: **Restrict bikes to paved trails to protect sensitive artifacts and species**. The proposed pedestrian trail near Canary Stairs must remain
 DG or compacted dirt due to water authority easements. Implement a **speed limit** for bikes.
- 7. <u>Pedestrian Paths</u>: **Limit trails to those in the Master Plan**, except for any trail that has become overgrown from disuse. Enforce rules to keep people and dogs out of restricted areas.
- 8. <u>Fencing and Signage</u>: **Install fencing and consistent signage** to prevent access to unsafe areas, such as the bluff. Use QR codes with multilingual options and maintain design continuity with Talbert Park and Randall Preserve.
- 9. Remove Improper Materials: Remove and dispose of inappropriate fill and mounds that pose safety hazards.
- 10. Rename the Park: Suggested new name: **Fairview Nature Preserve**. This would help the City to secure funding for restoration projects.
- 11. <u>Clarify Definitions</u>: Provide clear definitions for "passive use" and "passive activities." **Consider "low impact" as a standard**. Remove glider flying from this category—it is high impact due to the cable launch system.

Managing Fairview Park has been challenging in terms of both effort and cost. The City should consider forming a joint powers agreement with another authority, such as the County of Orange or the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority, to manage the park.

In addition to the photos of the existing fly field, I am submitting my five-year old grandson's drawing of what he loves about Fairview Park. When asked about the gliders, he said: "Only birds, bees and kites should fly in Fairview Park."

Dear Mayor and City Council,

I urge you to PASS THE FAIRVIEW PARK MASTER PLAN UPDATE DRAFT. MIG Consultants have put much work into the update to get the facts right. The three technical reports are so complete and comprehensive and show how the site became what it is today. I appreciate that these technical reports were released as soon as completed to give the public more time to read and comprehend such detailed information. 30-days wouldn't have been enough.

I understand that the Mitigated Negative Declaration is not sufficient as a CEQA review and I expect after this update vote, CEQA will be started for whatever projects approved. And even though a project may not trigger Measure AA, it does need a CEQA review according to tribal and environmental laws. "Fairview Park has an extremely high sensitivity for buried Native American origin cultural resources." (FPMP update pg. 39) CEQA established that "a project with an effect that may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a tribal cultural resource is a project that may have a significant effect on the environment." (Public Resource Code, 21084.2)

A few items to reconsider in the update are as follows:

- Change name to Fairview Nature Park or Fairview Park Reserve or Preserve
- No Vehicular access into Fairview Park from Pacific Ave.
- Allow bicycles on bluff trail like they are currently allowed
- No gliderplanes in Fairview Park
- Recognize Fairview Park as a unified sacred and sensitive Tribal land.
- No route down canyon

I have read all the written communications up to date so far. There has been much misinformation put out by the gliderplane flyers and in particular their president who has a habit of spewing inaccuracies like the one below.

In 'Written Comments' for Nov. 18th, 2025 City Council meeting ,HSS claims that they only remove or mow when allowed by city staff in response to CDFW email Sept. 25, 2025.

"The goals of the Master Plan Update, as stated in the publicly available technical documents, cannot be achieved while private citizens continue to take it upon themselves to grade and mow these sensitive habitats to maintain fly field runways on City property." (CDFW email to City of Costa Mesa pg.4)



Here is an HSS member filmed having mowed the vernal pool watershed on their own, without city staff approval or supervision. This picture was taken by a Costa Mesa resident on July 28, 2023. This HSS member quickly stopped mowing when he saw he was being filmed.

In fact, there have been many false claims by an HSS member especially against city staff and the experts. These ruthless attacks by an HSS member on city staff, and complaints about government agencies being unfair are all unfounded and unwarranted.

In fact, City staff has spent years and many hours focused on how to accommodate HSS by doing bird surveys, monitoring flying activity, and meeting with them to discuss their concerns. City committees have spent years going over information. YEARS of staff time, energy, and taxpayer dollars have financed a dwindling hobby that is desecrating Fairview Park. Governmental agencies have tried for YEARS to work with the city. The city is once again in violation of destroying habitat intentionally.

"Moving" a flyfield from west to east fails to recognize that the only thing that divides the congruous land is a road. West and east are one piece of sacred land and habitat. All of Fairview Park is a sensitive habitat as potential burial grounds for the Tongva and Acjachemen people. CEQA must be done prior to starting any project.

The years of misuse and abuse have taken their toll on Fairview Park's nature and the wildlife is not thriving but barely hanging on, that's why some are considered endangered or threatened.

With a new baseline and potential endangered and threatened species like the Crotch's Bumblebee and Western Burrowing Owl, CEQA is necessary. Incidental Take Permits are authorized only when potential damage cannot be mitigated or alternative feasible options have been exhausted. This has not happened because HSS refuses to consider moving out of a vernal pool watershed and out of Fairview Park to a more suitable location.

Please use common sense and move the gliderplanes OUT of Fairview Park. If gliderplanes are so important to city council, then please find them a place where they can thrive like Fairview Developmental Center, or Balearic Park.

Please respect city staff and MIG consultants which you hired to present the facts, because they have.

I support Fairview Park Master Plan draft with following exceptions:

1. Remove glider planes permanently from entire park.

Since glider plane closure in 2020, birds and insects have returned to fly field area, such as swifts, swallows and redwinged blackbirds in spring & summer, Say's Phoebe & western Meadowlarks in winter. In the past, glider (and drone) activities have disrupted habitats. I have seen planes chasing feeding ibis in vernal pool east of fly field area and operators walking through field southwest of hill. They were not good stewards of the Park. State, federal and restoration agencies have also recommended no glider plane activity anywhere in Fairview Park.

The narrow-gauge railroad provides opportunities for Park users and visitors to see the East Park and may lessen off trail use. The lupines in spring are beautiful.

Dear City Council,

I am writing in support of the Draft Fairview Park Master Plan. I support keeping Fairview Park natural, restoring native plants to the park, supporting bird and other wildlife inhabitants of the park, and maintaining trails to allow people to enjoy the beauty of the park. I live in the Upper Birds neighborhood of Mesa Verde, which abuts the east side of the park, and I regularly walk the trails in the early morning. Watching and listening to the birds and insects and snails as they fly or crawl in the park is a simple joy for me. I am so grateful for this natural resource so close to my home.

I understand that the fate of the glider planes in the park is a hugely contentious issue. Soon after we first moved to Costa Mesa in 2003, I was delighted to see the model airplanes in the park. It looked like a great hobby that several generations of people could enjoy together. I later learned that the location of the model airplanes so close to sensitive vernal pools was causing damage to those pools, and that the planes' use of that airspace discouraged several species of birds from coming to the park in the numbers that they appeared during the pandemic, when all glider flights were suspended. Open space for nature is a rare commodity, and I believe we should prioritize preserving this natural resource for everyone in our city to enjoy. The model airplane hobbyists can find other sites to fly their planes, but we can't create new vernal pools for the fairy shrimp. I support moving the glider planes out of Fairview Park.

I also urge the city to increase its support for maintenance and trash collection in the park. It's a shame to see the trash that is left along the trails and in the brush throughout the park, and especially near the parking lot next to the Waldorf School. I have spent several hours on multiple occasions in the last 5-6 years picking up trash in the park on my own. Each time I have filled 2-3 grocery bags stuffed with trash. Additionally, the fences in the lower wetlands area of the park are in bad shape — wooden posts have disintegrated and metal cables have snapped. Once a Master Plan has been approved and trails are improved with new fencing and grading, I urge you to include sufficient maintenance costs in future years' budgets so that the fencing stays intact and the trails stay clean.



We, the undersigned, urge the **City of Costa Mesa** to recognize the importance of our community values and shared commitment to conservation by **preserving Fairview Park** as a place where nature and history can continue to thrive.

Our goal is to demonstrate our collective appreciation for this vital green space and to advocate for its continued protection as an area for **passive use**—one that safeguards its rich biodiversity, protects the cultural artifacts found here, and honors the **Indigenous peoples** who have long held this land in reverence.

We believe Fairview Park should remain a space for **learning, reflection, and stewardship**, where future generations can connect with both the natural environment and the deep cultural history that makes this place so special. We therefore **urge the City to adopt the Draft Master Plan** to accomplish these goals and ensure the protection of this park for the future.

Additionally, we respectfully request that **no herbicides or chemical weed control methods** be used in the management of the Fairview Park. These substances are known to pose significant health and environmental risks, impacting not only local wildlife and plant biodiversity but also the wellbeing of visitors, children, and nearby residents. We encourage the City to implement natural and sustainable management practices that align with the park's mission of preservation and ecological balance.

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Dear Mayor and City Council,

I am writing as a resident of Costa Mesa and as Chair of the Parks and Community Services Commission. I'm disappointed to see that the robust conversation we had at the special PACS meeting on October 30, 2025 was distilled to just a few lines of text in the City Council report for this evening's meeting. I'm also disappointed to learn that even though we are a citywide Commission, appointed by each of you, PACS will not be allowed a full 10-minute comment alongside HSS and the FP Steering Committee. I think it's important that government processes be made as visible as possible, and in this regard, the stature and impact of PACS has been diminished to a few lines of text in a city report and removal from the agenda for tonight City Council's. It's unfortunate, and hopefully not representative of the esteem in which you hold the PACS Commission as a whole.

At the October 30th meeting, PACS reviewed a matrix that we found helpful for decision making. I've included it with this letter. There are a variety of additional recommendations in it, and I hope it can help your close review of the FP Master Plan. I had hoped to walk you through this in the meeting.

A note on the most controversial aspect of tonight's conversation: PACS voted 3/2 to move the flying field out of Fairview Park. This should have been noted in your agenda packet, but was not, even though Vice Chair Wright asked that it be communicated to you all. So much like your other appointed body—the Fairview Park Steering Committee—we recommend that Fairview Park no longer house the flying field. This is also in line with the paid consultant you've hired to work on the project, and multiple Fairview Park administrators. I hope that this governing body will recognize that the majority of your appointed bodies support moving the flying field.

Fiscal Accountability and Fairview Park/Flying Field

At the end of the special PACS meeting, I raised the issue of how much it will cost, financially, to keep the flying field at Fairview Park. If you can, please set aside any environmental or ethical considerations of why we might want to move the flying field. I hope what follows may help you ask questions about how much it'll cost to keep the flying field at Fairview Park.

<u>State Protected Resource Considerations - California Department of Fish and Wildlife</u> (CDFW)

Per the CDFW letter, the city would be required to obtain an Incidental Take Permit ("ITP") for the activity to remain in its current location, since the wildlife agencies (CDFW and USFWS) finds the activity to have a potential to cause "take" of listed species. **How much will a take permit cost? Is it an annual cost? One-time cost?**

The applicant/City of Costa Mesa would propose mitigation measures that, based on available evidence, would be sufficient to mitigate potential impact or "take" to the listed species that use the site.

- This includes mitigating the impacts to birds and avian species (non-listed species protected under CFGC), but also to CESA Candidate species Crotch's bumble bee and the Western burrowing owl.
- When the fly field needs to be mowed or maintained in some way, there
 would need to be mitigation measures including surveys and monitoring.
 How much will it cost to do these mitigation measures? Do we have
 a sense of what it costs for this work?
- After applying for the permit, per the Consultant who performs similar consultations frequently, the CDFW would impose additional required mitigation measures and monitoring for the City. This would have an annual operating cost impact to fulfill these required measures and complete prescribed reporting. Do we have a sense of how much this will cost?
- CDFW is not required to issue an ITP permit if the applicant has not exhausted available alternatives (e.g. alternative locations) and has not fully mitigated the impacts, or if the activity could jeopardize the continued existence of the species (Fish & G. Code § 2081). What happens if we don't receive a ITP permit? Will there be fines associated with this? How much do we estimate those fines to be?

<u>Federal Wildlife Species Considerations</u> – United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS)

- For the 2 Federally listed Resources, to comply with the ESA, the city would be required to consult with the USFWS and obtain permits to authorize "take." How much will this permitting process cost? Is it on an annual basis?
- The city could be expected to develop a Habitat Conservation Plan (HCP), which
 is quite involved, and has significant obligations. How much would it cost to
 develop this? Is this something that we'll need to hire a consultant to do?
- The city has a duty and an obligation to comply with the State and Federal
 wildlife protection laws. The city has a history of violations at the site, prior vernal
 pools violations, and there is high visibility for the agencies to impose penalties if
 needed. How much is it costing us currently for the existing violations?

 The city is having to do restoration now at a large expense until all of the performance standards are met and with mitigating for those impacts. Do we have a sense of how much this mitigating is already costing us?

Also, there is a range of anticipated costs for the process of applying for these permits. The process of applying for the permits would be between \$50,000 and \$100,000 (is this an annual cost?) for going through the permit application process. In addition, for operating cost of the permits, permitted biologists would be required to perform annual monitoring and reporting to comply with these permits which could cost in the tens of thousands of dollars per year. How much will it cost to hire these biologists?

I think the flying field offers really great exposure for the people involved in the activity, and hope that they can find another place where there are fewer fiscal impacts for the City of Costa Mesa.
